



To all those who knew Ivan Jones he will remain a lovable, well-liked teen-ager. Ivan was the kind of person who would give you the shirt off his back if you needed it.

Initiation was a day which will long be remembered by those who were on bended knee shining the Seniors shoes. Jack Baylor and Janie Rezner were our representatives for King and Queen at the Ag. Carnival. During the year seven students left the class.

Four new students joined us so we had twenty-four to start our Sophomore year. The following officers were chosen: President-Frank Brokaw; Vice President-Jack Baylor; Secretary-Jean Ravenscraft; Treasurer-Ella Simmons; Student Council Representative-Byron Winn; Reporter-Elizabeth Glenn; Adviser-Mr. Ingold. Our greatest event this year was winning the class tournament for which we earned the name "Soreheads." Ella Simmons and Jim Milligan, King and Queen contestants, represented us at the Ag. Carnival. During our Sophomore year we lost two of our classmates and gained four in the fall of '19 leaving twenty-six to start the last half of our high school days.

This year our officers were: President--Janie Rezner; Vice President--Jack Baylor; Secretary--Frank Brokaw; Treasurer--Pat Gibson; Reporter--Barbara Randall; Student Council Representative--Dick Ingold; Adviser--Mr. Ingold. Ella Simmons and Frank Brokaw were elected King and Queen Representatives for our class at the Homecoming Dance. Ella was crowned Queen of the Dance. The F. H. A. sponsored a carnival this year and had a Personality Queen contest. Loramae Nunn was chosen to represent our class. We won the class tournament again this year. On the 24th of March the class presented the comedy "Tish," directed by Miss Martha Nell Anderson, which was a great success. April 29 we held the Junior-Senior Banquet at Hawcock's Cafe in Monmouth. After the dinner the guests returned to Biggsville to a beautifully decorated Gymnasium where we danced to the music of Bill Christensen. Our chosen theme was "The Wishing Well." On March 22 the Juniors and Seniors went to Western Illinois State College to their Annual Guest Day. This year we lost five of our classmates.

Finally came the big moment when 21 of us walked in the door of B. H. S. as Seniors. This year saw many exciting moments, which will long be remembered. During the year we lost one classmate leaving us with 20 to finish the school year. This year our class officers were: President—Eddie Gray; Vice President—Ella Simmons; Secretary—Larry Sterett; Treasurer—Loramae Nunn; Reporter—Janie Rezner; Student Council Representative—Sydney Jacobs; Adviser—Mrs. Glenn; Co-Adviser—Mr. Jackson. We sponsored a Victory Dance on November 4. Ella Simmons and Frank Brokaw were our King and Queen contestants. They were chosen King and Queen of the Dance. The F. H. A. had a Personality Queen Contest at their Christmas Dance and Loramae Nunn was crowned Queen. Our acting ability was tested when we presented the "Boarding House Reach," directed by Mrs. Jean Swanson. In spite of the many difficulties which confronted us we had a large turn out and received many compliments for the fine work we had done. On May 24 we held our class night which was in the form of a television show. Sunday night May 27 we were invited to hold Baccalaureate in the United Presbyterian Church. Reverand McClelland gave the address. It was a happy, but sad graduating class that went to Oquawka May 28 where our graduation exercises were held with the G. & O. Seniors. The high light of the year was our trip, which covered more than 3,000 miles and included Washington, New York, Niagara Falls and Canada. This ended our Senior year with its many fine memories.

Ella Simmons has settled down and is now raising combination football, basketball, and track stars.



Poor Winnie! He had over played his hand. But a surprising event takes place which makes everything all right and he gets his big check after all.




















The Student Council is composed of the presidents, vice presidents and representatives from the four classes. Some teacher is chosen from the faculty to be the adviser.

The Christmas program was held in the gym December 15 in connection


