

The annual staff has been working very hard on the "Echo" all year and they are sure it is one of the best annuals ever printed.
























ACTIVITIES

















UNION HIGH SCHOOL

The new Union High School building designed by Behrensmeyer & Horn and Associates, Quincy architects, for Community Unit District No. 115 in Henderson county is under construction on a 44-acre rolling site at the junction of state Route 116 and U. S. Route 34.

The school is designed for an enrollment of 350 students with provisions for future expansion to handle 500. The new school will serve the commun-

ities of Biggsville, Gladstone, Oquawka, Gulfport and Rozetta.

The complete facilities include general classrooms, science rooms, bookkeeping and typing rooms, library, study hall, home economics and music rooms, cafeteria, kitchen, administration suite and locker rooms. The plant will also include a large gymnasium with seating for 1,000 and separate classroom and shop facilities for industrial arts and vocational agriculture classes.

The unusual plan features a dispersed design with the publicly used features built around a large enclosed court. The court will be surrounded

by a connecting fully glazed corridor.

The main classroom and library unit is semi-detached from the main body of the school with its only connection being a closed glazed corridor. The second detached unit will house the shop facilities and will be at the opposite end of the building from the general classroom facilities. The design, lay-out and selection of materials throughout the building stresses maximum fire safety, efficiency of operation, sound control and beauty.

A special design and teaching aid in the classrooms is the use of plastic


dome skylights complete with built-in motorized light control louvers.

In conjunction with the controlled daylight features, the lighting design includes cold cathode strip lighting in all classrooms and general academic areas. The main stage serving the gymnasium-auditorium area is to be equipped with special stage lighting, complete with controlled dimmers, border lights and spotlight.

Biggsville, Gladstone, and Oquawka will move classroom equipment in the Summer of 1960. Classes will begin in September in the new Union High

School.

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

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
