The Department of Agriculture, under the direction and teaching of Secretary of Agriculture, Charles L. Noble, accomplished the purposes of vocational agriculture in the class of 1945-1946.

The Biggsville Chapter of the Future Farmers of America organized early in the school year of 1945-1946. The following officers were elected to carry on the functions of the chapter: President--Phillip Law, Vice President--Daryl Baylor, Secretary--Wendell Larson, Treasurer--Joe Morris, Reporter to Biggsville News Letter--Hauer Noble, Member of Congress--Roger Kelly.

The officers and advisor attended the F. F. A. officerst training school held in Monmouth. They had charge of opening one of the business sessions.

There are 27 members in the local F. F. A. carrying 50 agricultural projects. Total profits from projects for the year equalled $\$ 11,157,72$ divided between the following projects: hogs, $\$ 5,447.03$; beef, $\$ 3,673.50$; poultry, $\$ 7.82$; sheep, $\$ 434.61$; crops, $\$ 286.14$; and dairy $\$ 16.18$. Fair premiums for the year totaled $\$ 518.25$.

Each year the chapter selects a project champion. This year Robert Seymour was selected for this honor. His name has been engraved on a plaque in recognition of his outstanding project work. Bob graduated in the Class of 145.

The source of revenue for the treasury was the selling of Funk's garden seeds and putting on a carnival. The garden seeds netted a profit of $\$ 12$ and the carnival $\$ 80$. The money was used to defray expenses during 1945 and 146.

M1ss Betty Armstrong was elected queen of the F. F. A.-Home Ec. carnival and Joe Morris was elected King. Both were duly crowned by Phillip Law.

The Chapter held monthly night meetings at the Agriculture room in the High School. Ping pong and basketball tournaments were held.

Parents and sons gathered on March 8 for the F. F. A. Banquet. This banquet was put on by the F.F.A. boys in honor of their mothers and fathers. The banquet marked the cllmax of the Department program of the classes of 1945-1946.
