The Student Council is like the Congress which represents the people in the national government. The Student Council makes the laws which govern the student body. They try to make better use of the resources within the school.



The Student Council, like the Congress of the United States, can accomplish much for the benefit of our school, if it has the cooperation of the student body.








After working out an apprenticeship in the office of the "Henderson County Journal," the former Miss Betty Noble is now Editor of a county wide chain newspaper.


Coach Patterson, after being a star himself at Western, reports taking his basket-ball squad to the State Tournament three years in succession.



During the year three members moved away and Billy Simpson joined the class. Two boys, Lee and Pete, represented the freshmen in the "Services of War."



Being the second oldest class enrolled in Biggsville High the Junior Class is proud to bear the name of "The South" in our Echo.






Eight boys went out for basketball this year and did very well. Seven went out for track also.

Chorus was a popular activity with many freshmen joining.


The class agrees that it has been a great adventure being freshmen but it will be more exciting to be sopnomores.


The band feels that in the year of '45 - '46 it has made more progress than in any previous year.



The Department of Agriculture, under the direction and teaching of Secretary of Agriculture, Charles L. Noble, accomplished the purposes of vocational agriculture in the class of 1945-1946.

The Biggsville Chapter of the Future Farmers of America organized early in the school year of 1945-1946. The following officers were elected to carry on the functions of the chapter: President--Phillip Law, Vice President--Daryl Baylor, Secretary--Wendell Larson, Treasurer--Joe Morris, Reporter to Biggsville News Letter--Hauer Noble, Member of Congress--Roger Kelly.

The officers and advisor attended the F. F. A. officers' training school held in Monmouth. They had charge of opening one of the business sessions.

There are 27 members in the local F. F. A. carrying 50 agricultural projects. Total profits from projects for the year equalled \$11,157.72 divided between the following projects: hogs, \$5,447.03; beef, \$3,673.50; poultry, \$7.82; sheep, \$434.61; crops, \$286.14; and dairy \$16.18. Fair premiums for the year totaled \$518.25.



Like most American families the Rains family had their troubles, and, at most times had more than their share.



Finally after an attempt to kill his wife and also to prove that Bud was not his real step-son, David was convicted of being the real villain.


Walter Dawson, the wastrel uncle and Elizabeth, the whining maid added to the comedy of the play.






The softball season opened last fall with 25 boys reporting for action under command of Mr. Ingold as Secretary of War.




Biggsville had a very good season this year with no defeats in scheduled or tournament games. Biggsville loses three Senior players this year but the prospects lock very good for the coming year.
