



The council also elected the Echo staff for this year.







SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

On August 28, 1944, twenty new students entered the portals of B. H. S.

The chosen leaders for that year were: President--Lee Maxwell; Vice President--Ada Shafer; Secretary and Treasurer--Carita Martin; Student Council--Arthur Olson; Faculty Adviser--Mr. Henry.

Initiation was a day of memory to all who came under the hands of the frightful seniors.

During the year three students dropped from the class and one entered the class.

Sixteen happy sophomores returned to B. H. S. in the fall of 1945. Before the final day rolled around in May seven had been dropped and three were added to the roll.

Pete Boyd was elected president and Jim Armstrong was his standin. Barbara Milligan became class treasurer and secretary. Student Council representation was handled by Marcia Downes while Nedra Day reported the class news. Pete Boyd relinquished his job to Jim Armstrong during the year.

The third round of high school battling began in the first days of Indian Summer of 1946.

This year our officers were: President -- Carita Martin; Vice-President -- Nedra Day; Secretary and Treasurer -- Barbara Hughes; Student Council -- Lee Maxwell.

The school year of 1946-1947 was a busy one for the juniors. On November 1, 1946, the class presented the comedy "Aaron Slick from Punkin Crick," directed by Miss Margaret George.

April 25 found the Juniors presenting the Junior-Senior Banquet at Hotel Burlington. The theme was a Hawaiian scene.

We started the year with twelve students and adopted the name "Dirty Dozen." Our class membership remained the same for the year although one student left and one entered.

On September 1, 1947, thirteen happy-go-lucky seniors entered the hall of B. H. S. for their final lap of high school education. Two members were lost during the year bringing the final graduation number down to eleven.

On October 8, 1947 the class observed Skip Day by spending the day in the Quad-Cities.

Our final theatrical production was given on October 31, under the direction of Mrs. Eva Price.

The class adopted blue and white as the colors and blue and white carnations were the chosen flowers.

"Whatever your lot in life may be, build on it" became the class motto.

The Junior-Senior Banquet was held on May 14 at Burlington and the Senior breakfast was also held in Burlington on May 24.

The final act of the four years came on May 26, 1948, in the High School Gym. Graduation ceremonies were observed in a special manner as the class of '48 became the fiftieth and last class to graduate from Biggsville Township High School.

We now leave the High School and all of our fond memories to those who will follow, hoping that they will have as much fun as we did.

Lee Maxwell is still studying in his room at Champaign. Lee claims he hasn't had a date since he left high school.



JUNIOR CLASS




During the year Mary Alice Ferguson, Ruby Richardson, Don Overton, Lois and Richard Britton left the class and Wesley Kilgore joined it.




JUNIOR PLAY

Their next appearance was at Ocuawka. Again they placed second, winning over Keithsburg but losing to Ocuawka.


On April 23 they had their only home meet. This was with Gladstone and by a very few points, Gladstone emerged as the winner.


