## Gladstone Class History

Twelve years ago twenty-six students demanded an education at the Gladstone Grade School. Eleven eager freshmen walked up the stairs, little knowing what was to come in the next four years. Some of the activities that year were hayrack rides, a Valentine party, a Christmas dinner, a trip to Springfield at the end of the school year and we also took part in two one-act plays.

We started as Sophomores with more enthusiasm because there were others greener than we were (meaning the Freshmen). Class officers were elected as follows for the coming year: President--Pauline Rhoades; Vice-President-Paul Green; Secretary--Allene Asbury; and Treasurer--Paula Rhoades. Mrs. Hinman was our class sponsor. At the beginning of the year we had a Variety Show, which proved to be a success. We won second place at the Freshman-Sophomore Tournament held at Oquawka. We had our annual Christmas dinner and an all-school athletic banquet at Hotel Burlington.

Our Junior year was far more exciting than our other two years as we were no longer known as "Green Freshmen" or "Silly Sophomores." We were now the "Jolly Juniors" which held quite true in our case. Our candidates for carnival king and queen were Allene Asbury and Bob McGraw. Miss Jeannette Caldwell was our Junior class sponsor. During the spring we took part in two one-act plays, "Crook Catchers" and "Rumors Wanted." After many long years of waiting, we received our class rings of which we were very proud. We Juniors entertained the Seniors at a banquet held in the Methodist Church basement and later journeyed to Burlington to attend a movie. We sold pop at the softball games to earn money to add to our Senior trip fund. We also kept busy during the summer by preparing a stand for the Gladstone homecoming.

## Oquawka Class History

Eighteen green Freshmen entered the halls of the old Oquawka High. We wandered around like sheep until Mr. Campbell and some of the upper-classmen took us under their wings and helped us out. It wasn't long until the sophomores gave us a set of rules we must follow for one day---good old initiation. Boy! were we ever glad when that day was overl We were then full-fledged members of O.H.S. Soon we were holding a class meeting to elect officers. Gene Hoskins was elected President; Jim Pirtle, Vice-President; Enma Jean Curtis, Secretary and Treasurer; and Marilyn Thompson, Reporter. One of the members of our class, Gene Hoskins, dropped out after Christmas due to sickness. This was a tough year for our class as six members dropped out before the school year was over. Our activities were limited this year, we only had a paper drive and helped with the school carnival. our class officers for our Sophomore year were as follows: Dale Pruett, President; Danny Lox, Vice-President; Marilyn Woods, Secretary and Treasurer; and Vera Seaton, Student Council representative. We won first place in the Freshman-Sophomore Tournament held at Oquawka.
