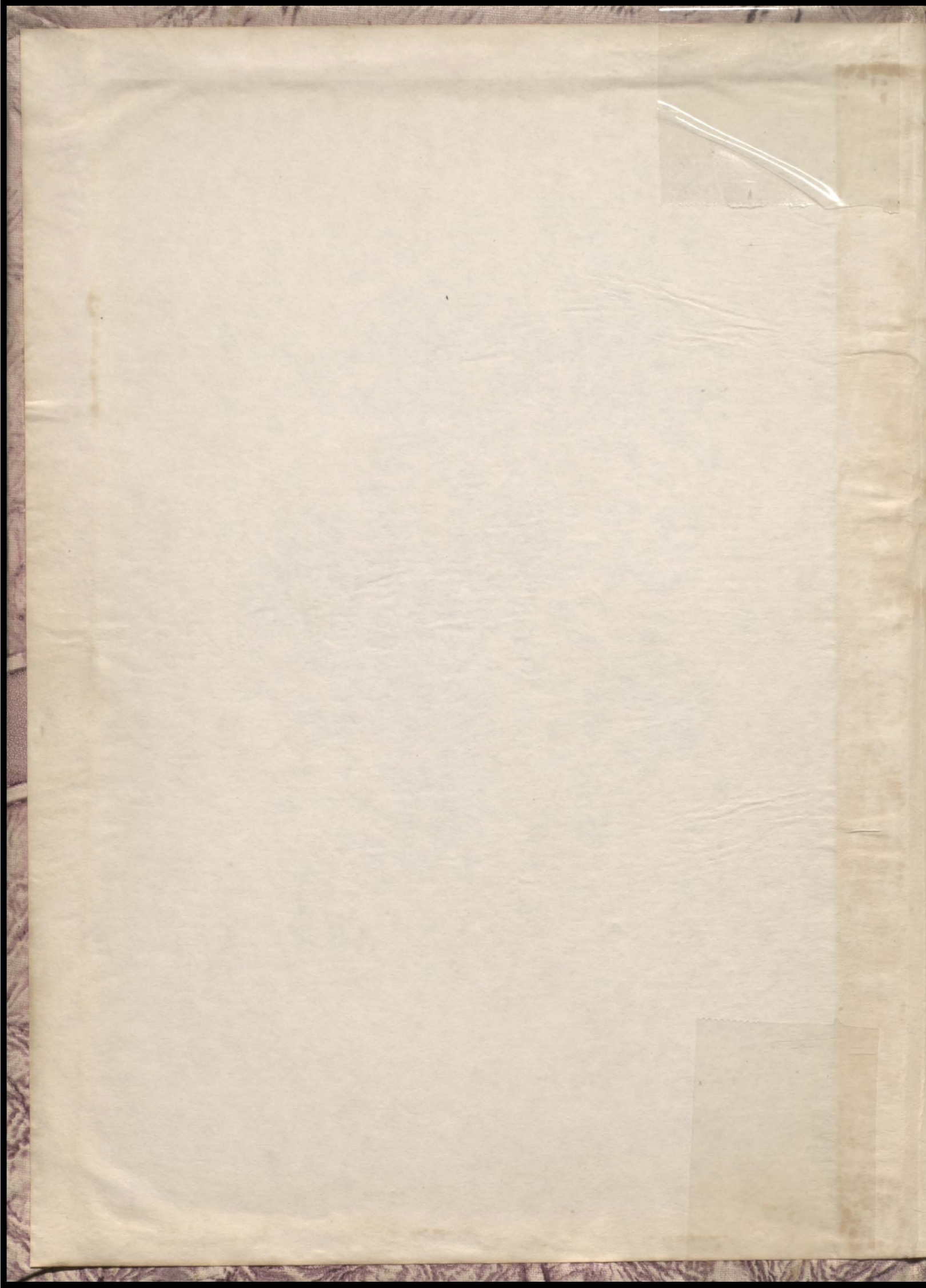

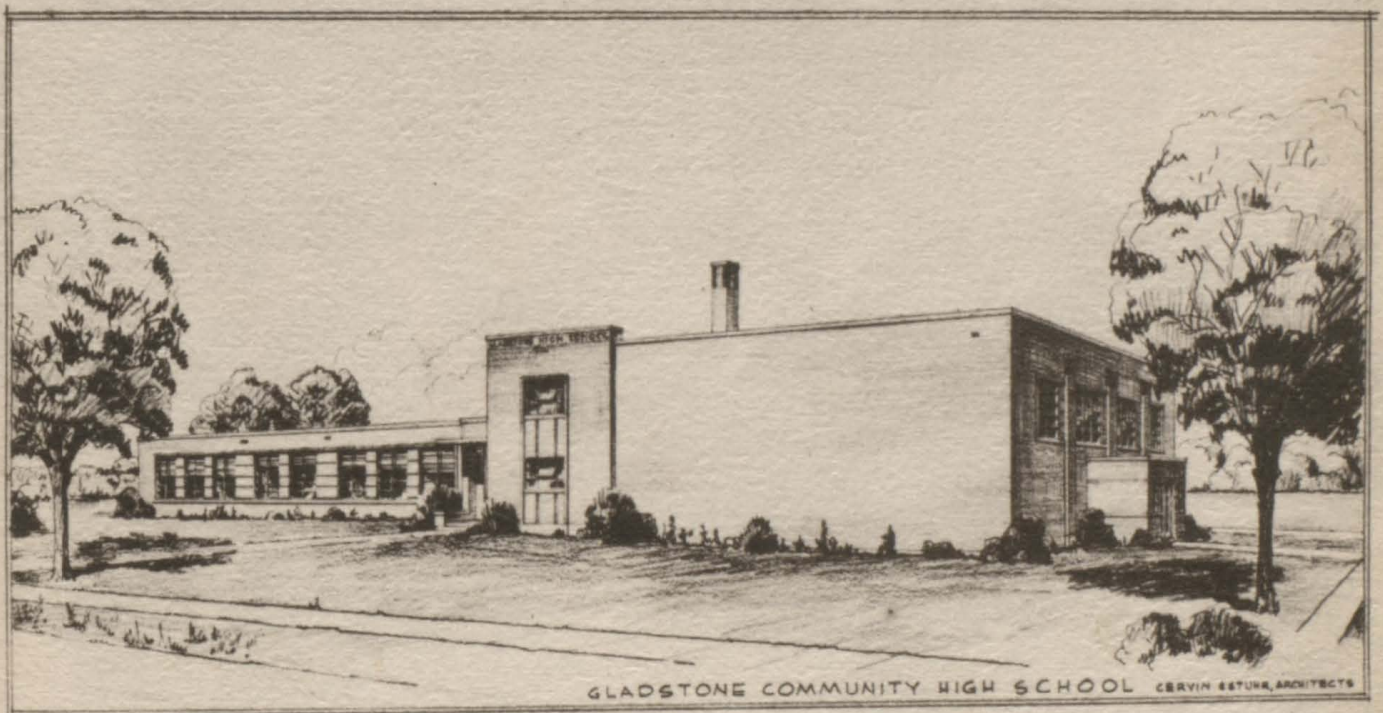

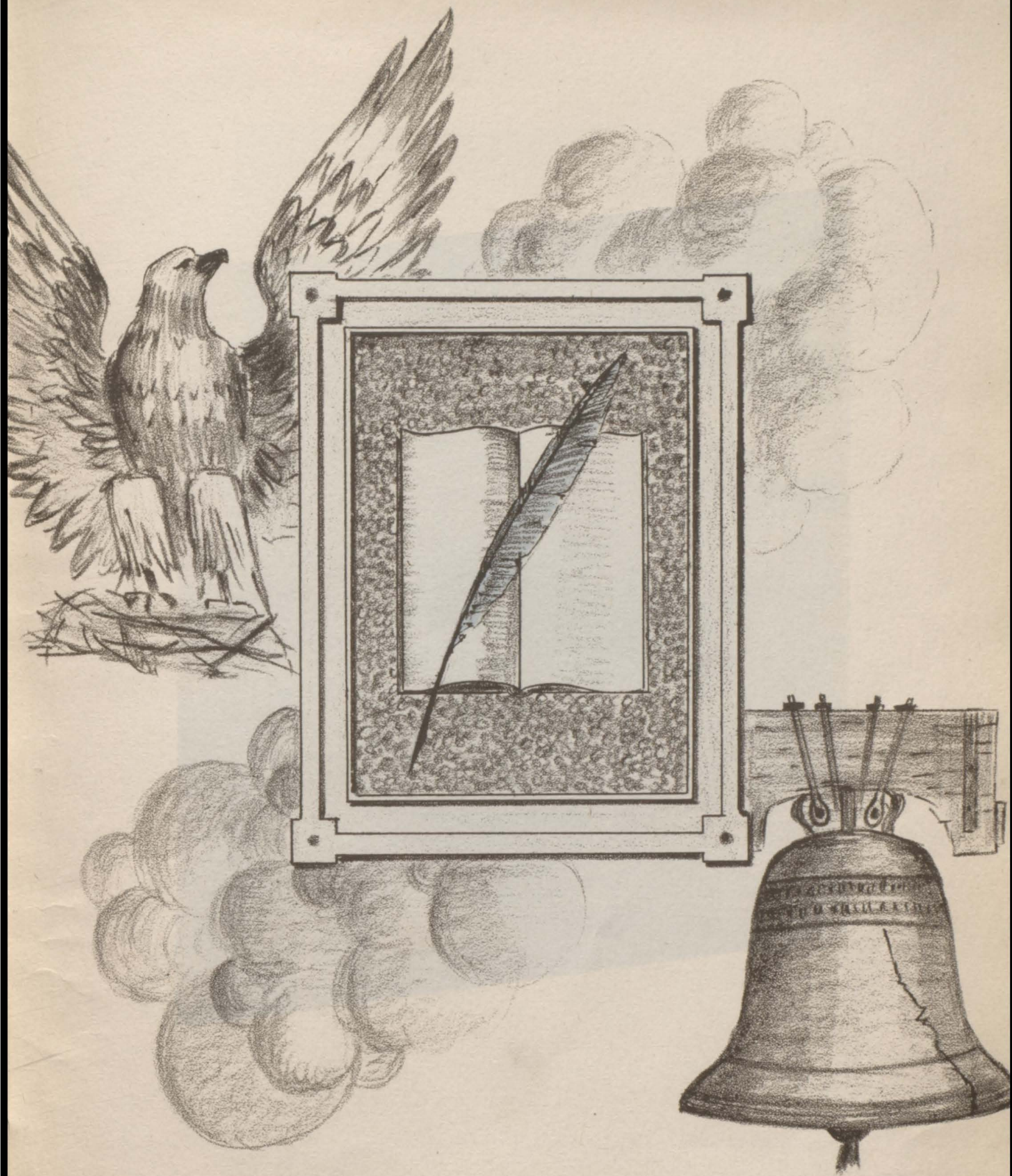
HAPPY ROCKER STAFF

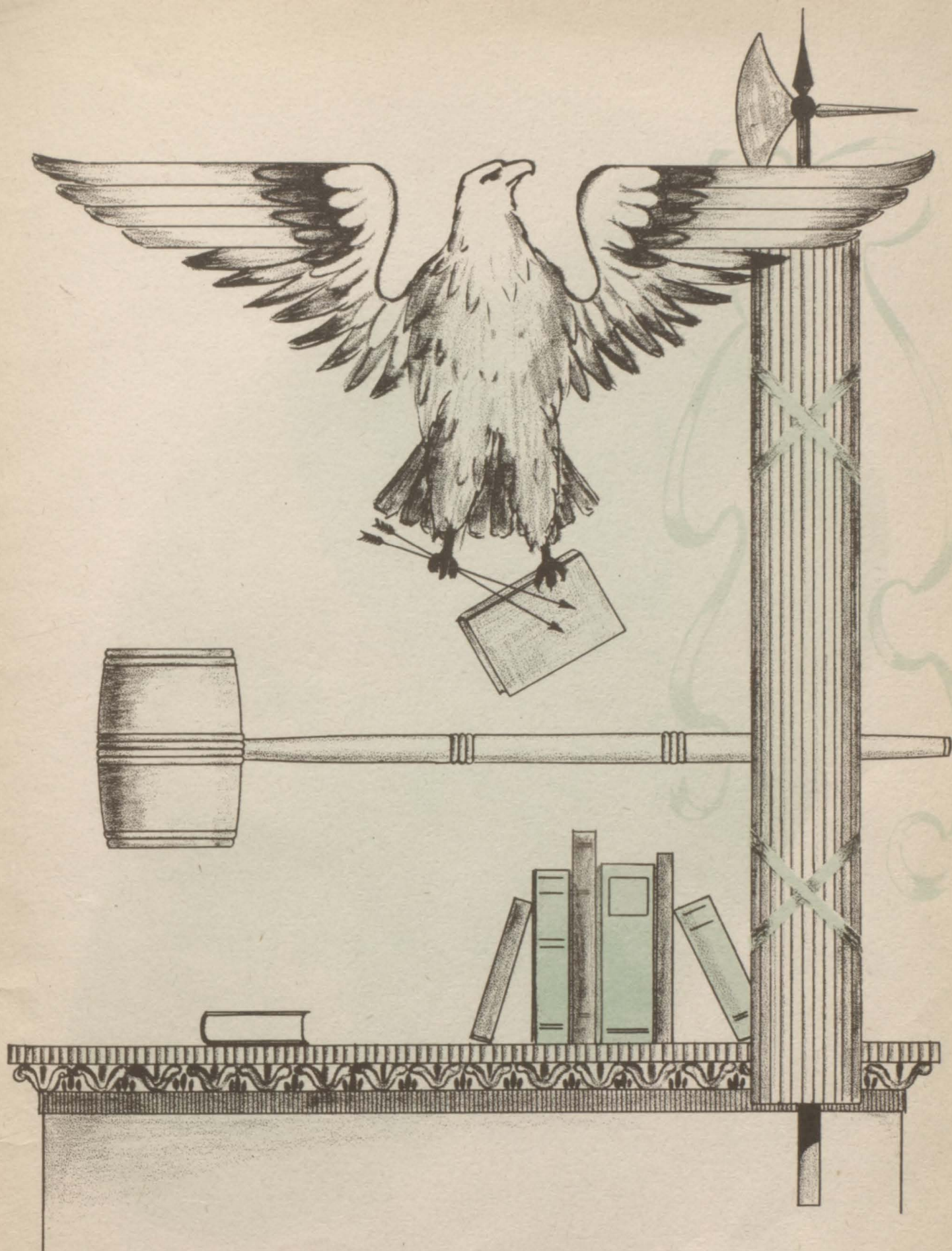


DEDICATION
