





MR. JAMES


Senior Class History





Senior Prophecy


8th. period -- Sammy Stevenson

Dennis Ahlberg is student assistant for the hot lunch program. He sells tickets each morning, collects and summarizes reports, and assists in the lunch room at noon.



This is G-O High School's second yearbook. The Staff has attempted to accurately portray life at G-O and make a yearbook of which everyone interested should be proud.


