The third annual copy of the yearbook, Memories, was prepared by the office practice class. With Mrs. Swanson as their advisor, the class sold advertisement to finance the yearbook, chose the cover design, decided upon the contents of the yearbook, and planned the page layouts. The ads, which were sold in Gladstone, Oquawka, Burlington, and Monmouth, were stenciled and mimeographed by the class. The layouts were then prepared in final form and mailed to Kansas City, Missouri, for reproduction. Finished pages, together with the mimeographed advertising, were assembled by the class and taken to Galesburg for binding and covering.

Behind the scenes in each school there are various individuals who contribute a great deal of time and effort in numerous ways to further the activities of the school.

Mr. Morrison, school treasurer, has a very exacting task since he maintains a record of all money which is received or disbursed in the operation of the extra curricular activities of the school.

Mrs. Marr is faculty publicity director. Each week she collects news from the teachers in the various departments, writes the general news of the school, types these news reports, and sends copies to the Burlington Hawk-Eye Gazette, The Henderson County Journal, and the Daily Register Mail. These news items are also given to the school paper and annual staffs for use in their publications.

Mr. Zuege maintains an accurate attendance record for each pupil. At the close of each month, he provides each teacher with a summary report of attendance for each pupil whose absence is excessive.

Mr. Wright maintains a record of Hot Lunch ticket sales for both the high school and the grade school. Each morning that school is in session he sells tickets to the teachers in their home rooms, collects a ticket sales report, summarizes the report, notifies the cooks how many to expect for lunch, and sees that the number of tickets sold tallies with the number collected at the lunch room.

Joyce Stewart collects an attendance report from every teacher during the last period of the school day. Teachers check attendance each period and for each
