

The play went off smoothly, and everyone seemed to enjoy it. As the year neared its close, twenty-six seniors began to count the days. The great adventure was nearly over. What next?

Such things as caps, gowns, cards, and invitations became topics of conversation. Where would their graduation be was also discussed. The twenty-eighth of May became an important date. The vast halls had been traversed. With lingering footsteps, the class of '53 approached the final threshold. No longer hesitant, now fully confident, they stood poised to walk proudly forth into a new life!






