



The course offerings this year were Mechanical Drawing, Fundamentals of Woodworking, Electricity, Woodworking, Bench Metals, Sheet Metals, and Welding.





Three years of additional mathematics is taught for pupils who wish to meet the college entrance requirements for advanced study in mathematics, science, or engineering. A one-year course in elementary algebra is offered in the freshman year. This is followed by a one year course in plane geometry for sophomores. The third year of mathematics includes one semester of advanced algebra and one semester of plane trigonometry.



JAMES SMITH--Jim is the last of the "Romeos" to arrive in Hollywood and he is quite up to "SNUFF!"


