PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE


For many years man has prophesied that we are now at the cross roads of civilization. Whether we are now, or in years past, will only be known to posterity. We do want each and everyone who graduates from Media to realize more fully that as he graduates from high school, life will become immediately more complex. New problems will arise and each in turn will have to be solved.

It is the desire of the Media High School faculty and the members of the Board of Education that every student shall have gained some learning that will enable him to survey with proper consideration, new proposals, whether they be community, state, national or world wide. Often many plans sound as they seem at first, but are found, under closer observation, to incorporate very serious faults that may act as a burden on future generations.

For instance, Communism, with its plan to divide the wealth of our nation, may sound good to a person with no wealth. Most of our values are in materials. Communism is revealed in all of its ugliness when one discovers that if we divide the wealth of this country that one might receive fifty-two dollars in cash, and one-hundredth interest in a blast furnace, plus two steel rails, half a dozen auto tires and perhaps a hundred cedar posts. This is even more severe when Communism demands the end of all churches and substitutes a church organized by the leader of the state. Fortunately, or unfortunately, wealth can be gained only by hard work.

We do not mean to be pessimistic. We firmly believe that there is plenty of opportunity to succeed in this country of ours with its freedom of religion, speech, and press; provided first, that each student is endowed with proper religious and moral conscience; second, that he continues to have faith in our system of free enterprise; third, that if everyone remembers the high prosperity that comes through the destruction of war is not continued through years of peace. Many high school boys, accustomed to earning five to ten dollars a day and getting thirty-eight per hundred weight for their project steers, should not be too disappointed when prices of goods level off to a place that our fatners vividly remember. We believe that if one has these things in mind plus a willingness for hard work, that every American can go just as high up the ladder of success as he desires.

Chapter II



Billie Hess and Cornelius Saben represented us for carnival Queen and King.


Marie Lynch represented us for the Homecoming Queen.

Basketball season was an expecially money making time, since we got to run the eat stand.


Our biggest money making project was picking up corn. We picked up about five complete days. We made approximatily \$500,

In the Annual School Carnival our two new members this year, Carroll Livermore and Shirley Vernoy, represential us for King and Queen.


In sports the boys were very active. Each boy had his own particular job to do for each game.


All members were active in the organizations and activities of the school.



After arriving at Mexico City we went directly to the Arena and bought our tickets and went inside to find our seats. When we found our seats, who should be sitting in the next seat but Shirley Vernoy. I learned that her name was now Alentovetchow and the bull fighter was her husband. One of our successful money making tasks during the year was picking corn.






The Junior Class Play, "Strictly Confidential" was given March 31, with Mr. Sharpe as our director.

Our managers were Eldon Neff and Mickey Utzinger. Dean Melvin and George Torrance were captains of the team. The results of the games were as follows:







The regular schedule opened on November 15 with Little York and closed with Alexis on February 17, 1950.



There are thirty-one members in Vocational Agriculture, thirty of whom are members of the Future Farmers of America. The influence of older brothers was plainly seen in the fact that several freshmen had projects before the school term opened.

Among the big events of the year was our annual F. F. A. Banquet which was held on December 1, 1949. Mr. H. F. Dossey and Mr. Ed Keane were made honorary members of our organization. Our program consisted of colored slides which were taken in and around school. Especially emphasized were pictures of the members' projects which were taken from September, 1948, through November, 1949.

As in years past, a single stall hog-house was built by the F. F. A. and raffled off at the school carnival. Herold Bagely of Sciota was the winner.

George Torrance qualified this year for the State Farmer Degree. It should be pointed out that only 2% of the F. F. A. members in Ill-



inois can be so awarded.

The High School farm is the most unusual thing about Media High School as there are only three such farms in the state. None of the others are of commercial size. Throughout the year the students have been working on the farm. This work includes maintenance work such as building cattle guards, making gates, and constructing small buildings. Later in the year the agriculture classes will run soil tests over fields on the farm.

Many people have shown a high degree of interest in the High School Farm. During early 1949 an excellent article on the farm and school shop appeared in the FARM SECTION of the "Galesburg Daily Register-Mail". This article, with excellent accompanying photographs, caught the attention of the "Successful Farming Magazine", and they have prepared an article to appear in May, 1950. The F. F. A. has recently been contracted by the John Deere publication, "The Furrow", for preparation of a similiar article.


The High School shop has been remodeled during the past term by the agriculture classes. New cabinets have been installed in the shop, and its interior is to be painted in the future.



This year we have adopted several Polish families and have been sending boxes to them. The contents of these boxes were canned foods, dried foods, all kinds of clothing, and school supplies.








SENIOR CLASS PLAY

ence into spasms of laughter.



JUNIOR CLASS PLAY Synopsis







ENSEMBLES

Thirty-five high school students and several grade school pupils came out for band this year.




Preparations for the Media speech team was began last October when readings were received for this year's contestants.


