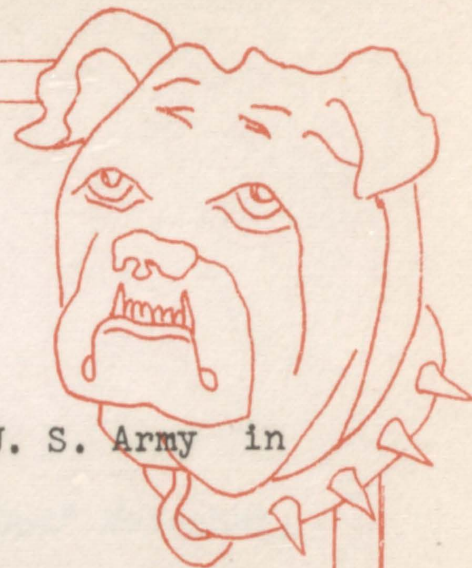
PROPHET

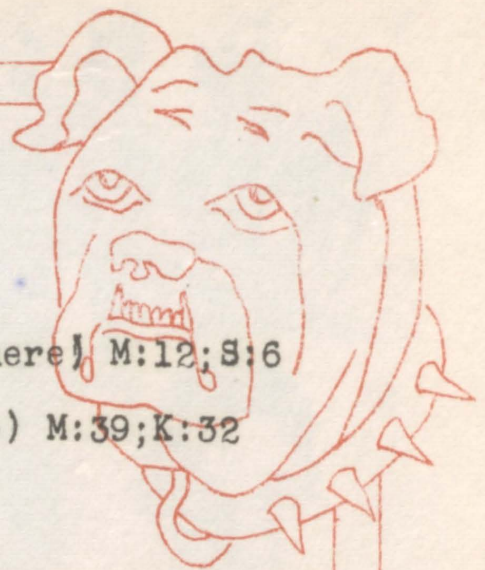
