At our first class meeting we elected Carl Shelton as our class advisor. The following officers were elected:



For the Homecoming dance we chose Lois Campbell as Queen of the Freshman class.


We chose Duane Torrance and Maryln Gittings to represent our class as delegates for King and Queen of the carnival.


The first event of the year was freshman initiation on September 9th. The freshman - sophomore party was held November 4th in the High School Gym.

We elected Mr. Walker and Miss Nugent as our class advisors and the officers as follows:



At our first class meeting we chose Mr. Shelton and Mr. Walker as our class advisors. The following officers were also chosen:





To the Freshmen we will and bequeath our paper, so they won't write all over the desks as we did.


To the Teachers we will our books, hoping that next year they will be used as much as this.




# PROPHECY

cute. Franklin spent a short term in the U.S. Army in the tank division.



shire and Raritan.




After everyone left, my wife and I enjoyed the remin-

Our Freshman year was full of fun, With laughs and tears for everyone. Initation was our first big chore, We'll remember it forever more.


Next come our Sophomore year, Our time to iniate was here. A Sophomore Dance we had planned one day, And then we put our plans away.

We decided at the second class meeting to have freshman initiation on September 7. No one was seriously injured! Ha!




### BASKETBALL


TUNE IN TONIGHT Story of the Play


our district competed. After that was the sectional contest which Media won and finally the Valley Conference speech contest in which Media tied for first place with Viola.
