For the Homecoming dance we chose Darlene Boone to represent our class as the Freshman queen.

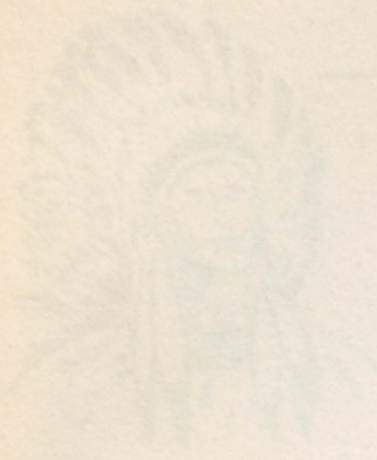
We chose Jean Ann Gibb and James Corzatt to represent our class as delegates for king and queen of the carnival.
