




CLASS WILL

The class placed second in the contest, just four points behind the seniors, who were the winners. From the group, Raymond Corzatt and Elmer Harden represented Media in the bicounty chorus festival.

The class officers for the freshmen year were: President, Robert Roark; Vice-president, Alice Wilson; Secretary, Charles Link; Treasurer, Hollis Thrush; with Miss Helen Larson as class advisor.

As sophomores we started the year with twenty members. Our first class activity was the freshmen initiation, at which as sophomores, we administered the oaths and creed to the freshmen with much pleasure to ourselves.

Again the class was well represented in football, basketball, track, music and in all other school activities.

The class had several parties, sponsored an Abraham Lincoln program, and lost, by one point only, the inter-class music and speech contest.





We had three other parties this year; one in return to the sophomores, one at the Rainbow Roller Rink in Monmouth; and we were our own hosts at a party given in March.


For our class king and queen, we chose Adalee Harden and Pat Keane.



A marching unit composed of sixteen girls from the gym classes took part in the crowning of the carnival King and Queen.


Dancing and gymnastics have also been a part in the gymnasium program this year.






