



CLASS HISTORY

A class play was given "Wild Cat Willy Gets Brain Fever" directed by Virgil Boucher. Ben Heap, Tom Arnold, Rosella Heap, Wilsie Tully, Mary Ellen Voorhees, Mildred Anderson, and Ruth Campbell took part in this.

The football season ended only to have basketball come in full swing. Boys representing our class were: Arnold, Creech, Forseman, C. Casteel, J. Casteel, Ben Heap, M. Hendrikson, D. Hendrickson.

In March our annual music and speech contest was held.

Mary Ellen Voorhees and Tom Annold entered. Mary Ellen Voorhees placed first in piano. Later Mary Ellen entered Military Tract in May.

The first school year was over for the Dutchmen.

Chapter 2

Another chapter in the life of the Dutchmen had opened in September. One member, Billy Creech, was lost and one gained, Ervin Bunch. Later in October, Charles Casteel left thus leaving us nineteen members.

The long waited-for revenge to be hosts to freshman initiation took place on September 26.

The freshmen returned a party for the sophomores by giving a hobo party on November 14. "Old Faithful" Daniel Hendrickson won the prize for the best costume.

Eddie Forseman was elected Class President, Betty Pogue, Vice President, Ruth Campbell and Ben Heap were our Secretary and Treasurer. The boys did very well this year in foot ball, basketball and track.

At our football banquet, we were proud to have Eddie Forseman elected as our football captain for the following year. The boys also enjoyed boxing which was introduced this year.

Several of the class members took part in the interclass music and speech contest.

Ruth Campbell, Mildred Anderson, Betty Lauver, Wilsie Tully, Margaret Schenck, Mary Ellen Voorhees, Rozella Heap, and Betty Jean Pogue were initiated in the G. A. A. at a luncheon held at Hawcock's and theater party at Monmouth on March 28th.

In the spring of this year, our last activity held was a roller-skating party with the freshman at Chandler's rink

Chapter 3

As the school year opened, all the class returned with the exception of Eddie Forseman. Later we lost two more Tom Arnold who moved to Dallas City and James Casteel dropped out to later join the Navy.

To start out, our first assignment was to elect class officers. The president was James Palmer who handled his office well throughout the year. To assist Jim were: Vice President, Ruth Campbell; Secretary, Rosella Heap; and Treasurer Betty Pogue. The advisor elected to guide our class was Pauline Pearson.

In October we had a skating supper at Monmouth with the seniors and faculty invited as guests.

This year Bob Gearhart, Norman Furnace, Tom Arnold, Ben Heap, Ervin Bunch, James Palmer were taking agriculture. In November these boys helped prepare for the annual F. F. A. banquet.

Betty Jean Pogue was nominated as candidate for queen of the carnival in November.

Ben Heap, Norman Furnace, Tom Arnold, Ervin Bunch represented our class in the field of sports. Ben Heap earned a varsity letter. We were unable to have football this year.

After Christmas the juniors presented "The Mad Hatters" to raise funds for our junior-senior banquet. We sold refreshments at the KMBS to add to our finances.

Many of our annual affairs could not be continued because of lack of transportation so there was quite a drop in school activities. On May eighth, our Junior-Senior Banquet was held at Burlington-our last affair before starting on our summer vacation. The theme of the banquet was Mexican. The entertainment was furnished by some of the students. Jim Palmer was toastmaster for the evening. After which we danced until nine o'clock and then saw "The Keeper of the Flame."

Ruth Campbell, Betty Pogue, Wilsie Tully, Mildred Anderson, and Betty Lauver particapated in chorus. Mary Ellen Voorhees was our pianist.

Betty Pogue, Mildred Anderson, Wilsie Tully, and Ruth Campbell were chosen to represent Media in the Bi-County chorus held at Stronghurst in April.

CHAPTER 4

To end the last chapter of our high school days we have thirteen students. A drop of seven from our freshmen year. Bob Gearhart, Norman Furnace, and Melvin Hendrickson left our ranks, but we gained one girl from Monmouth, Marilyn Newman.

Commencement was held May 18.







During the study of this unit, a dinner was planned and prepared for the faculty and board. "First Aid" and "Hand Work" were other units studied.

While studying this a trip was made to Burlington to visit a furniture store and see some of the things that had been studied previously. At this time the girls planned for the redecoration of the homemaking building and made draperies for the sewing room. "Care of Equipment," "Clothing," "Crocheting and Knitting," were also studied. When studying "Foods", the main thing stressed was meats. The girls visited the locker at Stronghurst and saw the cutting of beef and pork into wholesale cuts and then retail cuts. By these various studies they are learning to be better consumer buyers.

The Homemaking II and III spent six weeks in Red Cross and home nursing. This course covered first aid as well as many other useful suggestions for care of the sick.
