CLASS HISTORY

The following members left the ranks of our class during this year: L. Mowen, D. Russell, G. Casteel, and G. Thomas. We gained one member, M. Boyd. So ended our Freshmen year.

CHAPTER II

As Sophomores we began the year with twenty-five members. We lost one member when D. Bricker transferred to Stronghurst, and June and Helen Cleland joined our ranks. Early in the year, J. Lane joined the group only to leave at the end of the first semester. Still later we gained two more with the entrance of L. Saben and R. Collinson.

Miss Welsh helped us to get organized. We elected the following officers: President, R. Gibson; Vice-President, E. M. Harden; Secretary, H. Erickson; Treasurer, M. Boyd. As it was our duty to initiate the Freshmen we gave them a hearty welcome.

From the class M. Ross, A. Slusher, E. Brouse, M. Boyd, D. Burkett and E. M. Harden represented us in Bi-County Chorus. W. Spears was the only boy from our class in chorus that year.

Since we didn't have football this year we were well represented in basketball by E. Sullivan, H. Erickson and R. Johnson. Erickson and Sullivan participated in all the varsity games and they both won letters.

As King and Queen candidates of our class we chose A. Slusher and E. Sullivan. Other milestones of the year were four parties enjoyed by the class and their guests.

With the help of our advisor, Miss Welsh, we feel that this year will always be remembered.

CHAPTER III

Another eventful year began at M. H. S. with twenty-three Juniors enrolled. We had lost R. Collinson at the first of the year. Later on we lost D. Burkett and W. D. Vestal.

The first event of importance was election of class officers: President, W. Spears; Vice-President, E. M. Harden; Secretary, J. Lauver; Treasurer, E. Sullivan. We chose Miss Welsh again as our guide for the year.

The candidates for King and Queen were J. Heap and H. Mesecher. Heap was elected Queen of the Carnival.

Our football and basketball representatives remained the same, having improved and profited by their former experience. Letter winners were Sullivan and Erickson in football, basket-ball and track.

A new experience occurred in the lives of twelve members of our class when they appeared in the Junior Class Play "Watch Out For Spooks," under the capable direction of Miss Van Eaton. The cast worked diligently for weeks and finally presented the play in November. Something, however, that thrilled the whole class was the arrival of our class rings on November 23.

The following girls again took part in the Bi-County chorus: M. Boyd, M. Ross, E. M. Harden, E. Brouse and H. Cleland.

On May 7th we honored the Seniors with a banquet at Hawcock's in Monmouth. The theme was Hawaiian. This concluded another year in the lives of the class of '45.

CHAPTER IV

The last, but not least, year of our high school career began on August 31, 1944.

A few changes have been made. We are no longer the "green Freshmen," the "silly Sophomores," or the "jolly Juniors" of our former days. Now We Are Seniors! "Dignified Seniors!" We pace the halls of our domain and look forward. Two of our members are gone. Harry Mesecher took up farming and Winifred Roche moved to Monmouth, but we still number twenty.

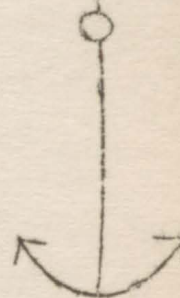

We began practicing March 1 for the Senior Play "A Mind of Her Own," and presented it April 6.

An exciting day for the Seniors was November 23, when we had our Senior Pictures taken. It brought us close, somehow, to that day when we graduated. May 18 was the eventful day, when twenty proud and happy Seniors received diplomas for four years of hard work well done!

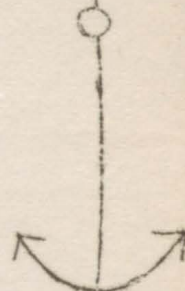
I, Ada Slusher, will and bequeath my wit to Delbert Rankin and my various hair styles to Doris Montroy.

The next day we looked her up in the Hollywood of London and spent the entire afternoon in her

luxurious apartments. She told us she was accompanied by her maid who was making her fame as a concert pianist on the side. She was none other than Leona Saben and when called in was very glad to see us. While we were reminiscing, she told us Helen was still in the States raising a brood of small Carlsons and being a good wife to a big Carlson. She was very happy and didn't envy her sister's fame as a British film star.

Because of a huge bombing raid over Germany which left the boys of London in no mood for a show, we left as scheduled the next night without presenting our acts. Paris was the next stop for our troupe and Sing Grosbey sang "The Last Time I Saw Paris" very appropriately as we marched through the streets. We had a terrific welcome and were made comfortable in a hotel in the heart of the city.

After doing our show we boarded our plane to go to the good old United States. We arrived in San Francisco and were immediately rushed to Hollywood to do a movie version of our tour with Sing Crosby and Hob Bope. It was called "All Roads Lead to Biggsville and Stronghurst". After the completion of our picture the following item appeared in the "Hollywood Gazette:"

"Two movie actresses, Elizabeth Keane and Mary Ross, who have just completed a movie version of their U. S. O. tours, left this morning on the Chief for Biggsville and Stronghurst."

So our trip had a happy ending. Elizabeth was met at the station in Stronghurst by the former Eileen Brouse and I took a bus to Biggsville where a station wagon bearing the name "Larson Farms" and driven by the former Arlene Lindgren took me to a certain farm south of Biggsville where I took up where I had left off and started raising little rose "buds."

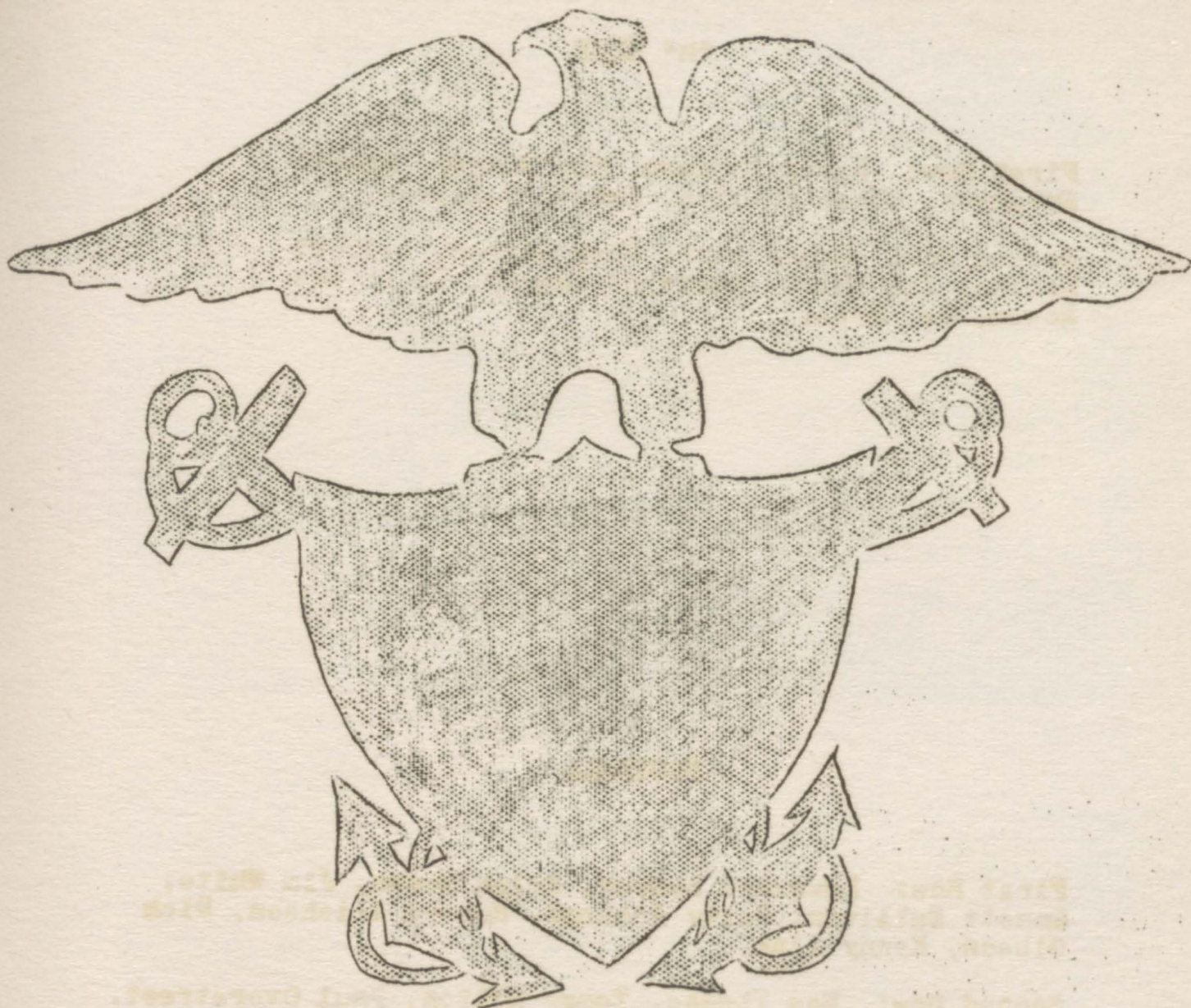

At the Aledo Fair the F. F. A. boys showed the following things.

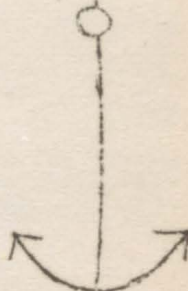
