
Arial view of the village of Media showing Media High School, the Teacherage and Home Economics Building.

The Chapter has prepared a program of work, under which it is operating, the progress made to be reported to the State Board of Vocational Education. Since the F.F.A. is really a teaching aid devised by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, it has operated in class work as well as independently. In general, the F.F.A. has attempted to promote large scale development of projects, which has been reflected in an unusually important student program, especially considering the small size of the Media Agriculture Department. The Chapter also has worked to promote activities of a social nature which have been enjoyed and some of which are yet in store for us. Some of the work of the Chapter has been directed to making money, this having been done as part of the shop work.

The members have built a number of good swine-farrowing houses which have become a part of their individual projects.

Media was proud of having an American Farmer Candidate this year, Ray Musser, winning a degree. No one unfamiliar with the scope of the F.F.A. can really appreciate just how hard these are to get and into what a select group Ray has placed himself. The Chapter was well represented at the National Convention at Kansas City, at which place the degree was conferred.

Media is absolutely unique in Illinois because of the High School Farm. No other school in the State has anything even closely comparable. This farm has been operated by the Advisor, Mr. Walker, but the F.F.A. Chapter has been often consulted on management problems encountered on this farm, and where possible, the members have actually performed farming operations dealing with such things as drainage, building and fence maintenance, pasture seeding, swine sorting for marketing, care of the dairy herd, and many other things too numerous to mention here. It is believed that actual work with a first hand problem is worth many periods of theorizing, and Media High School is fortunate to have this farm. The farm has side benefits also, illustrated by the fact that much student splashing is heard around the lake in the summer time.

The members of the F.F.A. feel that their work and the

work of their department is basic, as good agriculture is the basis on which Media High School exists. The members also recognize the parallel values of the work of the Home Economics Department and desire the chance to congratulate the girls on their progress toward making good homes in the future. The Chapter feels that these values can be recognized without lessening the value of the splendid work done by the other departments, without whose work none of us could fit into a culturered citizenry.






