
James is a quiet fellow, and we realize that the name turned in was from the depths of his thoughts.

"Things don't change much. Thousands of years ago, Greek maidens sat all evening and listened to a lyre. Today, many modern girls still do the same thing."


# CLASS WILL







## CLASS PROPHECY



During our Freshman year, we had a pot luck supper and all the teachers of the school were invited. We enjoyed ourselves after supper by playing games and dancing.




In our Sophomore year, we held a weiner roast for the Freshman at the old covered bridge, south of town. We gathered around the fire, sang, and told jokes.

Five students did not return for the Sophomore year; however, three new students enrolled; Helen Stokes, Elizabeth Curtis, and Lewis Adams.





## THE LIBRARY


One of Oquawka's former prominent citizens, James W. Gordon left our school a great number of valuable reference and fiction books. These books have proved to be very useful to the students.







#### STUDENT COUNCIL



## SOFTBALL


Oquawka's Softball team for the year of 1941-42 was exceptionally good. The team competed in eleven games, without a single defeat.

## HISTORY OF OQUAWKA HIGH SCHOOL

Our first Oquawka Township High School opened in the fall of 1914 in the old German Church building, south of town. About fifty years before that time, the building was known as the Allan Dale Seminary and some of our older residents attended private school there. Mrs. Florence Patterson tells us that she studied German there for a short time and at this time the Budshall brothers were in charge. They ran the school up until the Civil War when it is thought that they were called into service. The minister was the only teacher. He talked to his pupils in the large assembly room in the church. He and his family lived in the downstairs of the church.

The first year, only three years of High School were offered. Prof. Thomas Gallager was in charge. Prior to that time, the first two years of high school were offered at the grade school, with the seventh, eighth, ninth, and tenth grades in the same room under the instruction of one teacher.

Class periods were twenty or twenty-five minutes each and were held in the Assembly hall with the students sitting on the old church benches by the teachers desk, while the rest of the pupils tried to study.


In the fall of 1915, a four year course was offered with one additional teacher. A course in Home Economics was also added. Our equipment consisted of two oil stoves with removable ovens, a cupboard, eight tables and two sewing machines. Our water came from the school pump near the back door. Two class rooms were added this year, one also serving as a laboratory, with the Home Economics room and boys' and girls' separate cloak rooms. The entire first floor was occupied. These rooms were formerly the living quarters of the minister.

As the school was located near the edge of town, nearly everyone brought their dinner.

In these first three years no active part was taken in athletic or declamatory contests. The boys played ball in an adjoining pasture, also occupied by a few friendly cows. A stile was erected over the fence which separated it from the school. It was for the convenience of the pupils and was the first and only stile that I have ever seen.

In those first three years we had two thriving Literary Societies, namely "The Aeolian" and "The Utopian". The school was divided in two sides with a captain at the head of each and each month each side presented a program. The material for these programs were left entirely up to the Society, the only requirement being that a debate on some subject be given.

Other numbers were dialogues, drills, readings, music, or anything we could find. Visitors were allowed and so many came on

these Friday afternoons that there was often standing room only.

The first class to graduate from the four year course consisted of five girls and two boys. Graduation was held in the Opera House, a standing custom. Each graduate had to write his or her own essay, memorize it and deliver it on this night.

In later years, three and finally four teachers carried on, and a more active part was taken in sports. The Opera House and Kokos' Hall were rented by the school board for baskethall games and several firsts in declamation were won in the county meets.
