





IN MEMORIAM




We shall remember both of these young students for their jovial personalities, energy and enthusiasm which they displayed by taking active parts in school activities.

The highest tribute we can pay to Bobbie Jean and Donald is to say they examplified the qualities needed in every school and community for leadership and good admirable citizens.











All of her's will be the best in the land,


Everyone will say her styles are just grand.


On April 20, the chorus and band went to Roseville for the Bi-County Music Festival.
