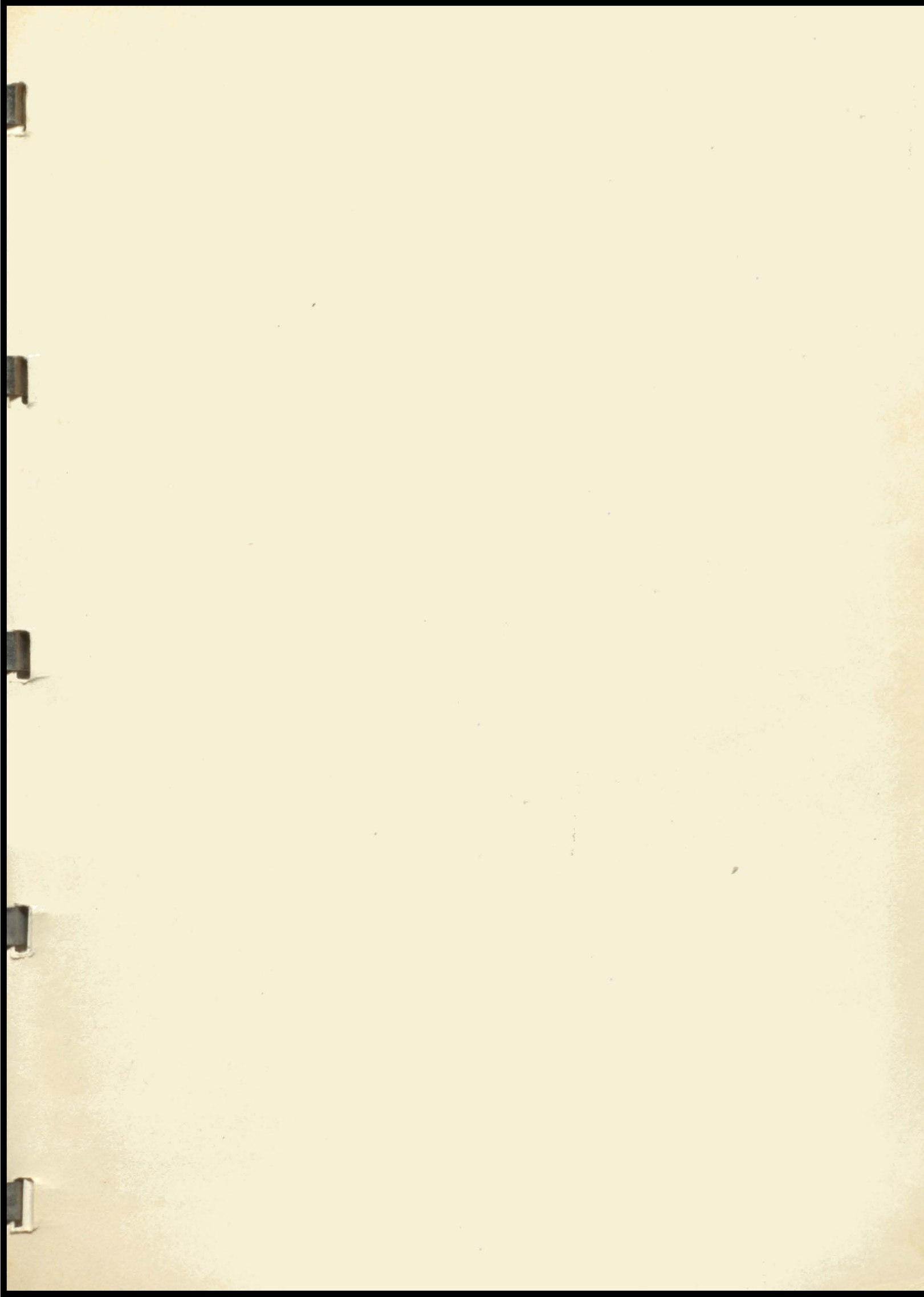
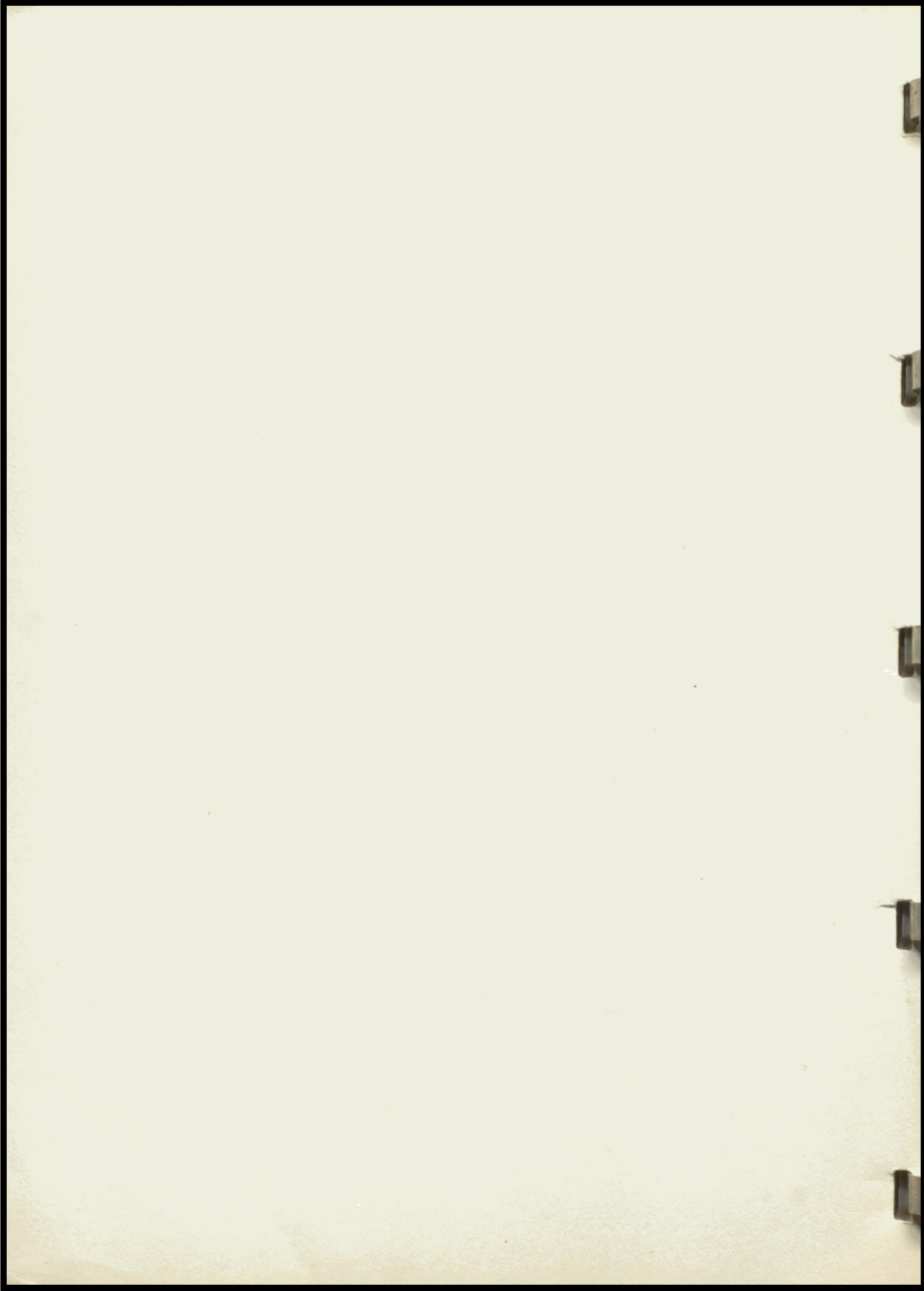


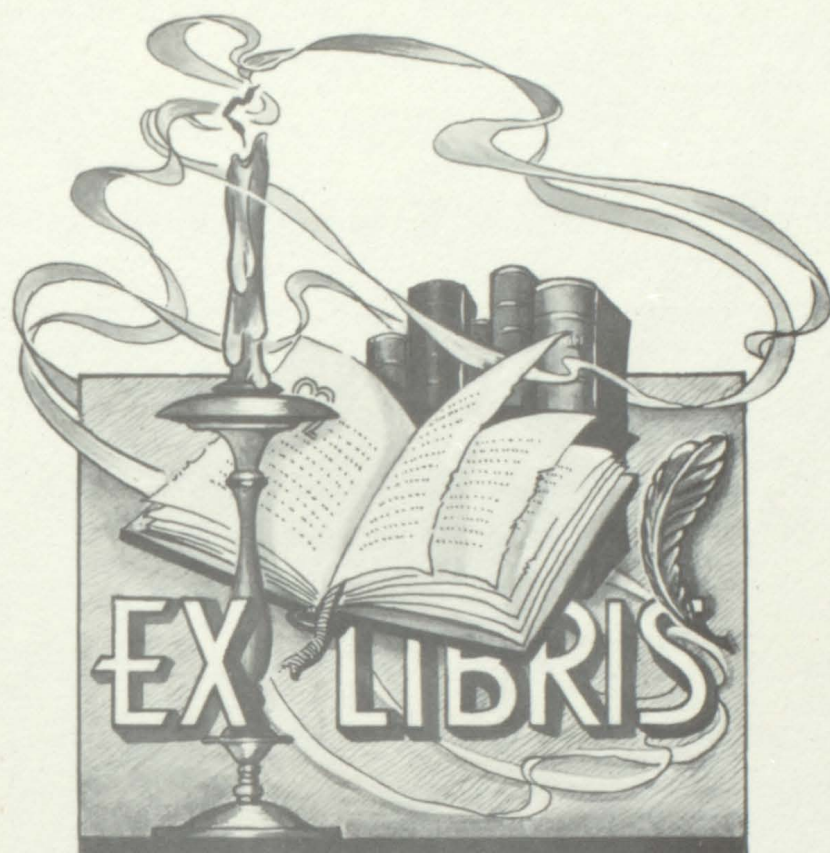

IN MEMORIAM

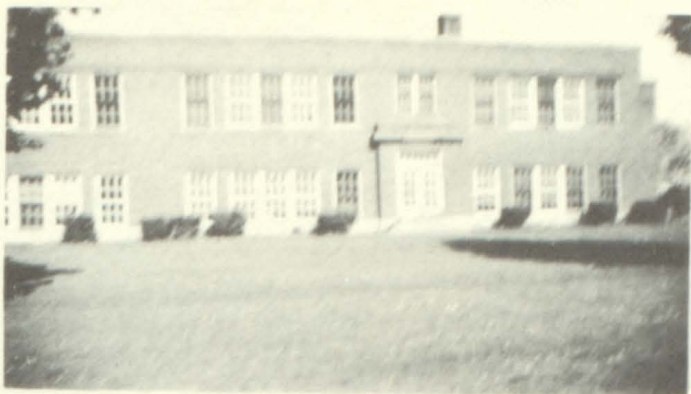

The Junior-Senior Banquet was held at Hotel Burlington May 6, and we wish to thank the juniors for a wonderful evening.

Our high school career, full of unforgettable memories, was brought to a close by the class trip.

We are proud of the fact that this year from our class Nancy Ford is one of the cheerleaders.

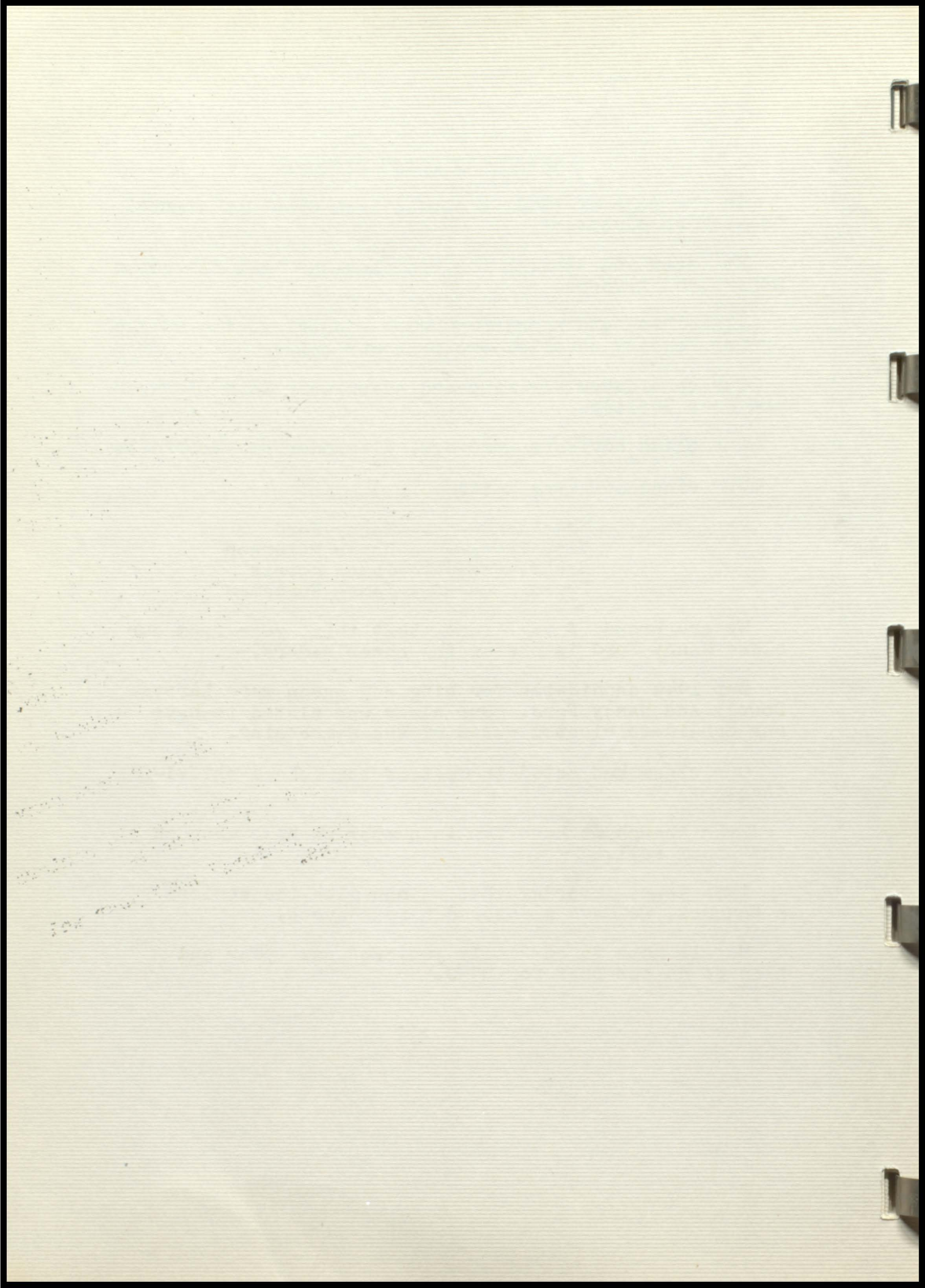
Our 1949 candidates for king and queen were Larry Dowell and Nancy Ford. Our class was elated to have our candidate elected queen of the Homecoming.
