Veva Booten won the Popularity Contest, "MissPopularity" sponsored by the Commercial Club Carnival.






JUNIOR-SENIOR BANQUET

Miss Veva Booten, a junior at Stronghurst High, won the Popularity Contest, sponsored by the high school yearbook club


This was the fifth annual carnival held at the local high school under the direction of Mrs. Inez Alexander. The proceeds from this event will be used in publishing the school yearbook.





F. F. A. ACTIVITIES 1950-51




SENIOR CLASS PLAY
