
We dedicate this BEACON to the memory of Jerry and Bob McIntyre, who lost their lives in a tragic accident Friday, October 21, 1955.



Committees were appointed by the sponsor and staff, giving each of the seniors a chance to publish the year's BEACON. The staff sincerely hopes that you enjoy




tes of the second quarter.
