Amid the largest crowd ever to attend a function in the history of the high school, estimated to be approximately three hundred fifty (350) people, Charles Hustead and Joyce Peterson, members of the senior class, were crown king and queen respectively by the two football captains, Bob Waddill and John Peterson. Attendants in the procession were Judy Stevenson, Wendell Shaner, Sandra Limbach, Terry Leinbach, Mildred White and Gerald Allison. Kathy Ford and Dana Georges were the crown bearers.

An estimated crowd of about 850 people including the bands and players,took part in the evening of merriment, which started off at 7:30 with the Trojan playing Alexis. The Alexis band gave a pre-game performance, which ended with both bands playing the "Star Spangled Banner." The game was breathtaking, as the Trojans failed to score at the end of the half. During the half, the Trojan band, under the direction of Mr. Misik, entertained the crowd with several formations, and both bands led the parade of floats. The main feature of the parade was the first football team Stronghurst High had in 1898. Two of the five living members occupied a car in the parade. They were Ernie Spiker and Charles Bowen; these two men were interviewed by Bob Lauver, and they described the football playing as was played in that day. The candidates from the various classes for king and queen were then introduced. The Trojans were the victors in the game, which ended with a score

WELCOME TO THE FOOTBALL HOP was the theme that greeted the visitors at the dance. This gave the gym a gala appearance; it was most appropriately and colorfully decorated with pennants bearing names of the schools and also of the SHS footba11 team and coach. Yellow mums were the chosen flowers featured to decorate one side of the gym, the orchestra pit, and the stage. Decorated goal posts of purple and white located at ends of the gym added to the appearance of the football field. A false ceiling of purple and white with small banners hanging finished the colorful trim of the gym

After parading in the business district, the group returned to the school grounds where a huge bonfire was burning. Coach Jones introduced the players and captains, Bob Waddill and John Peterson, who gave short pep talks. $\mathbf{M r}$. Deterding represented the faculty in giving a pep speech. The burning of the effigy of Alexis took place.
