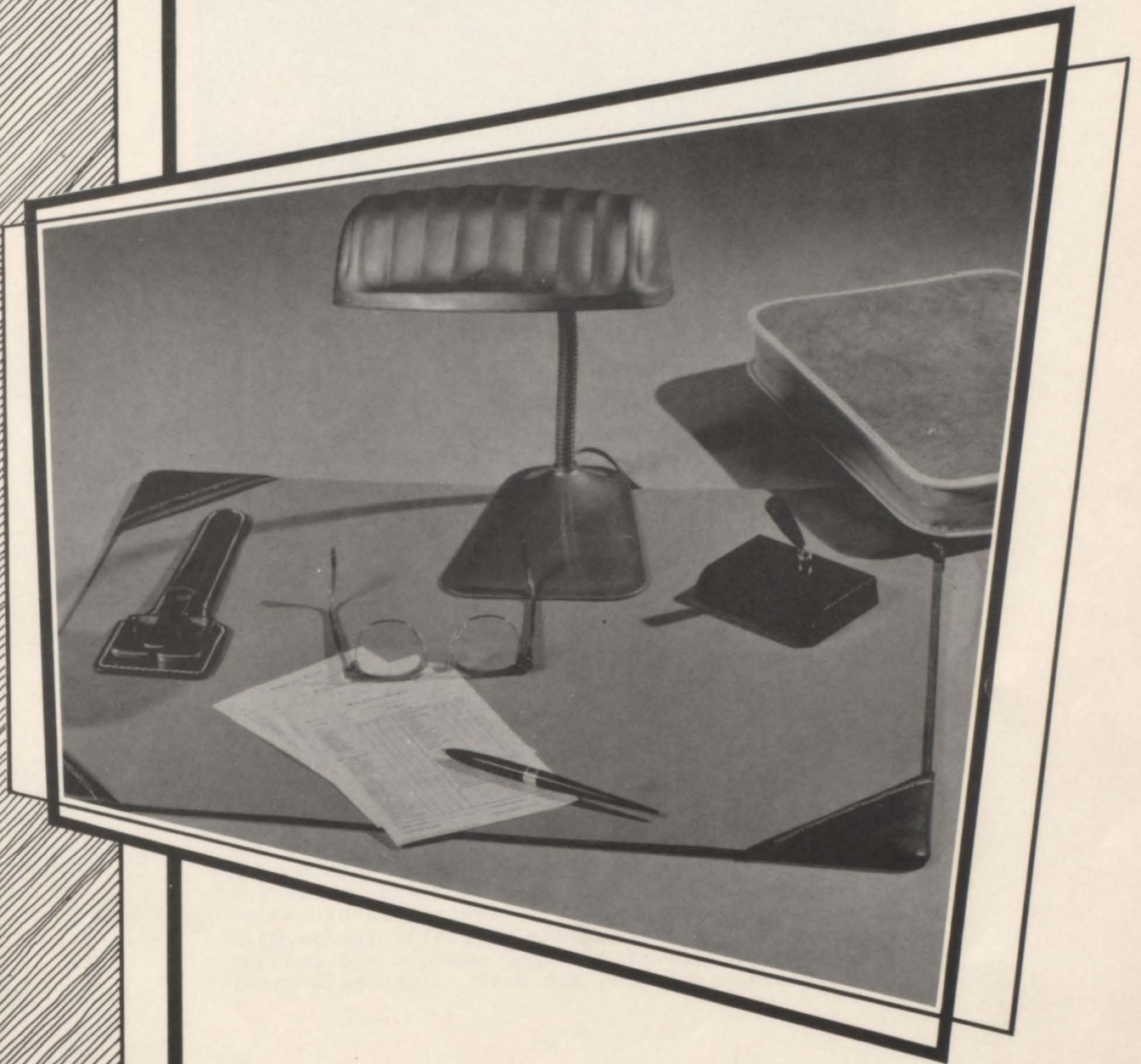
Mr. Layman has been with us for the past nine years and in that span of time has inscribed the following footprints:

tain satisfaction

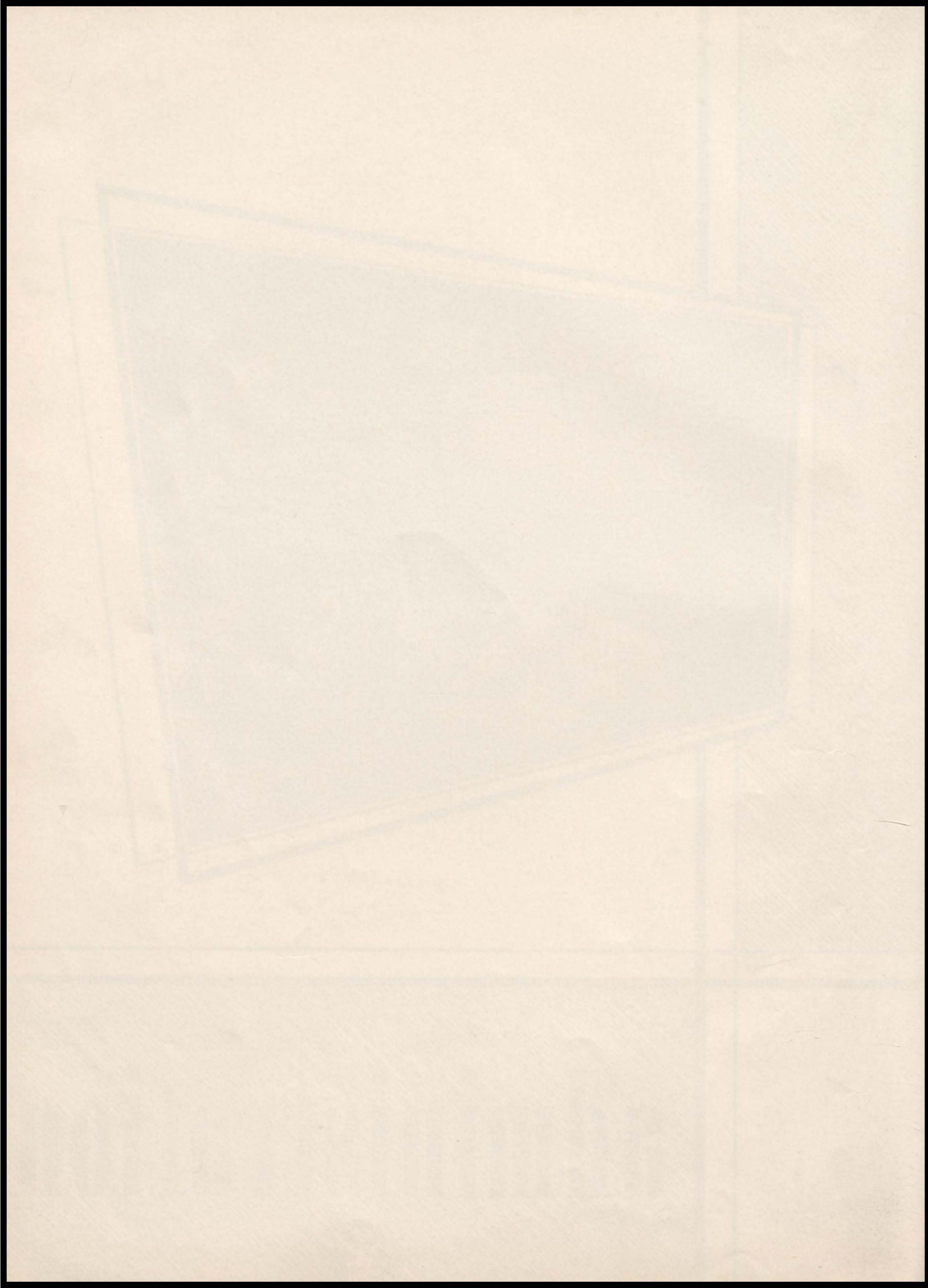

FACULTY FOOTPRINTS

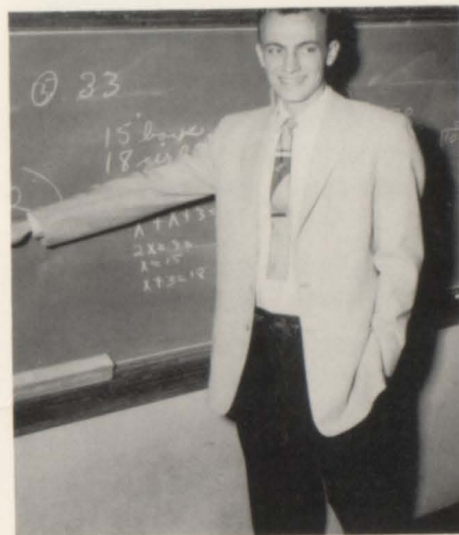

At SCHS the atmosphere between the faculty and the student is that of congeniality--our stately advisors, our friends, being noted for their sympathetic and kind understanding.

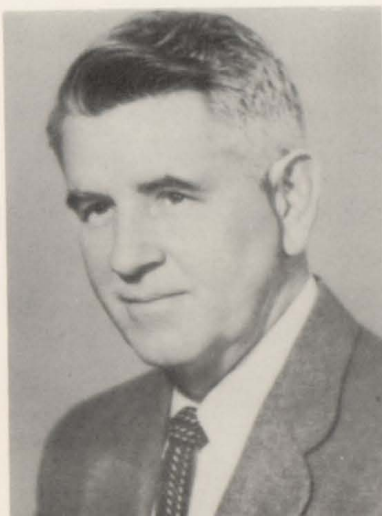

1. The first part of the report is a general statement of the purpose and scope of the study. It is followed by a brief review of the literature on the subject. The third part of the report is a description of the methods used in the study. This is followed by a presentation of the results of the study. 2. The purpose of the study was to determine the effect of the independent variable on the dependent variable. 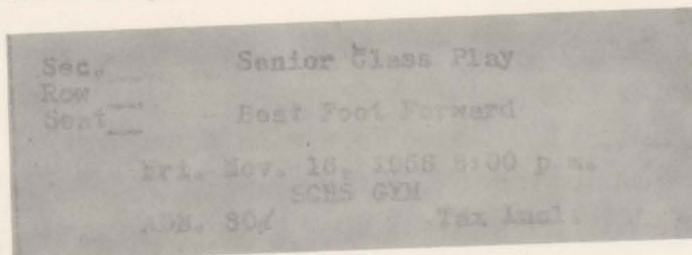
SENIOR PLAY

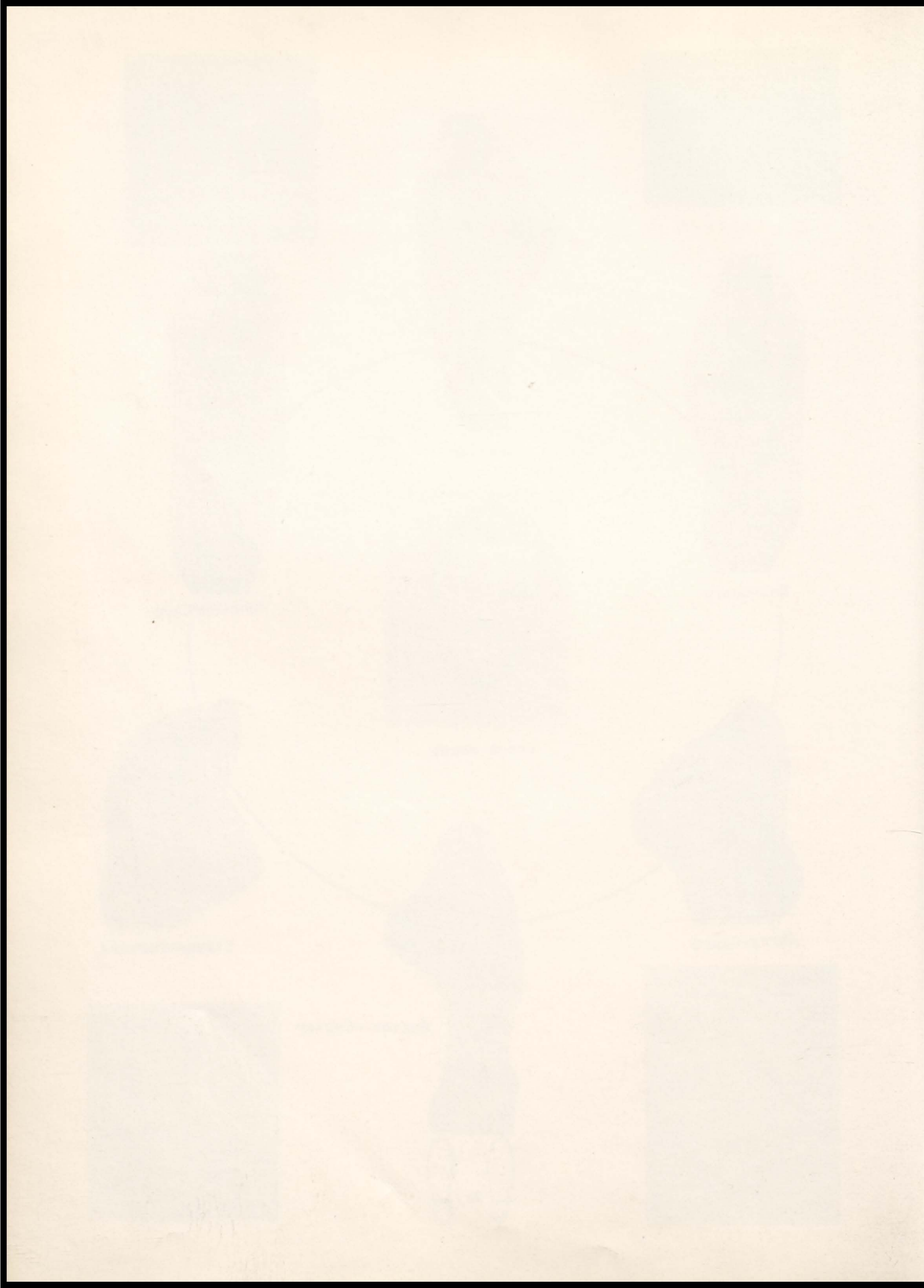
Stronghurst Wins Bi-County Tourney

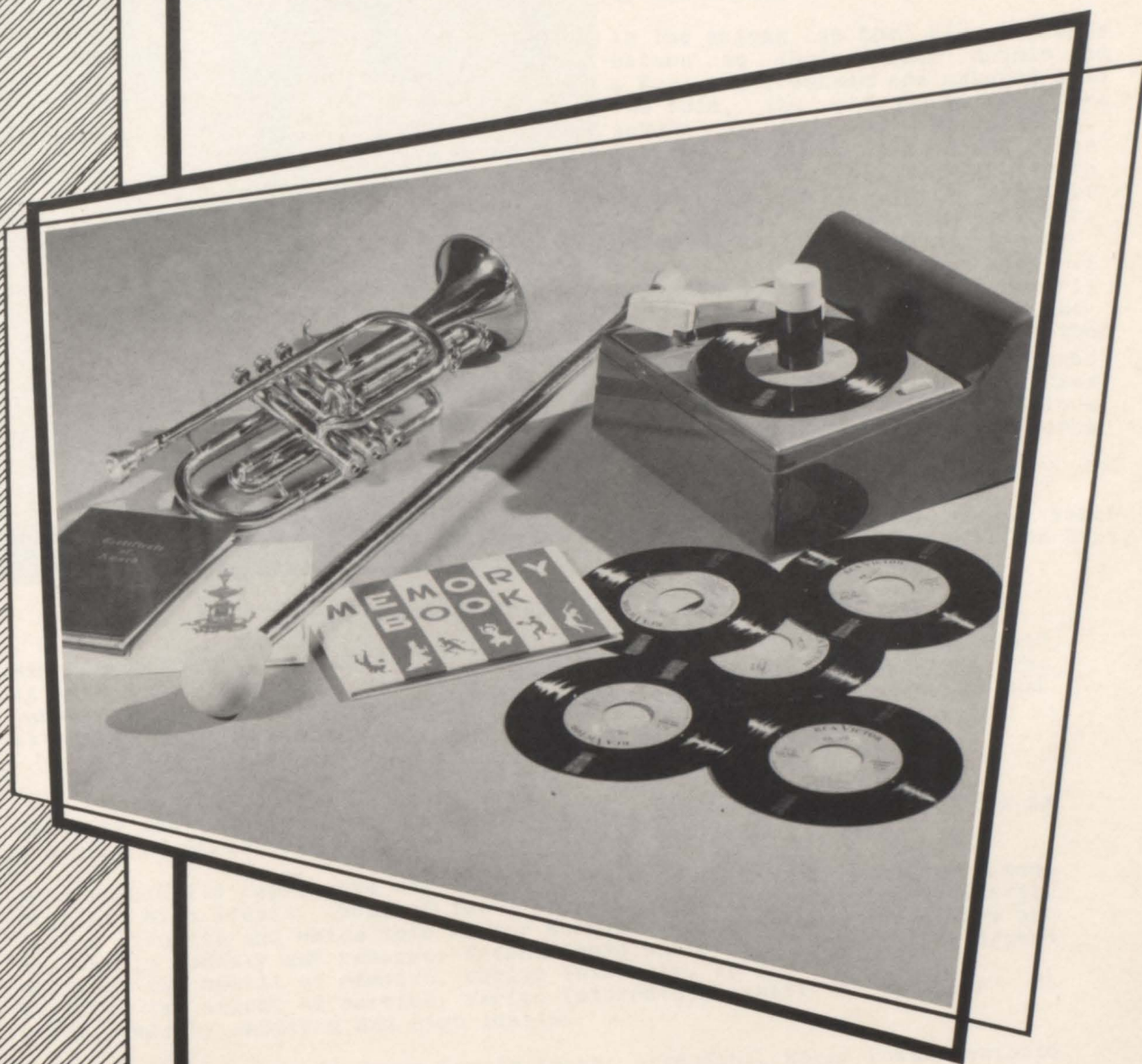

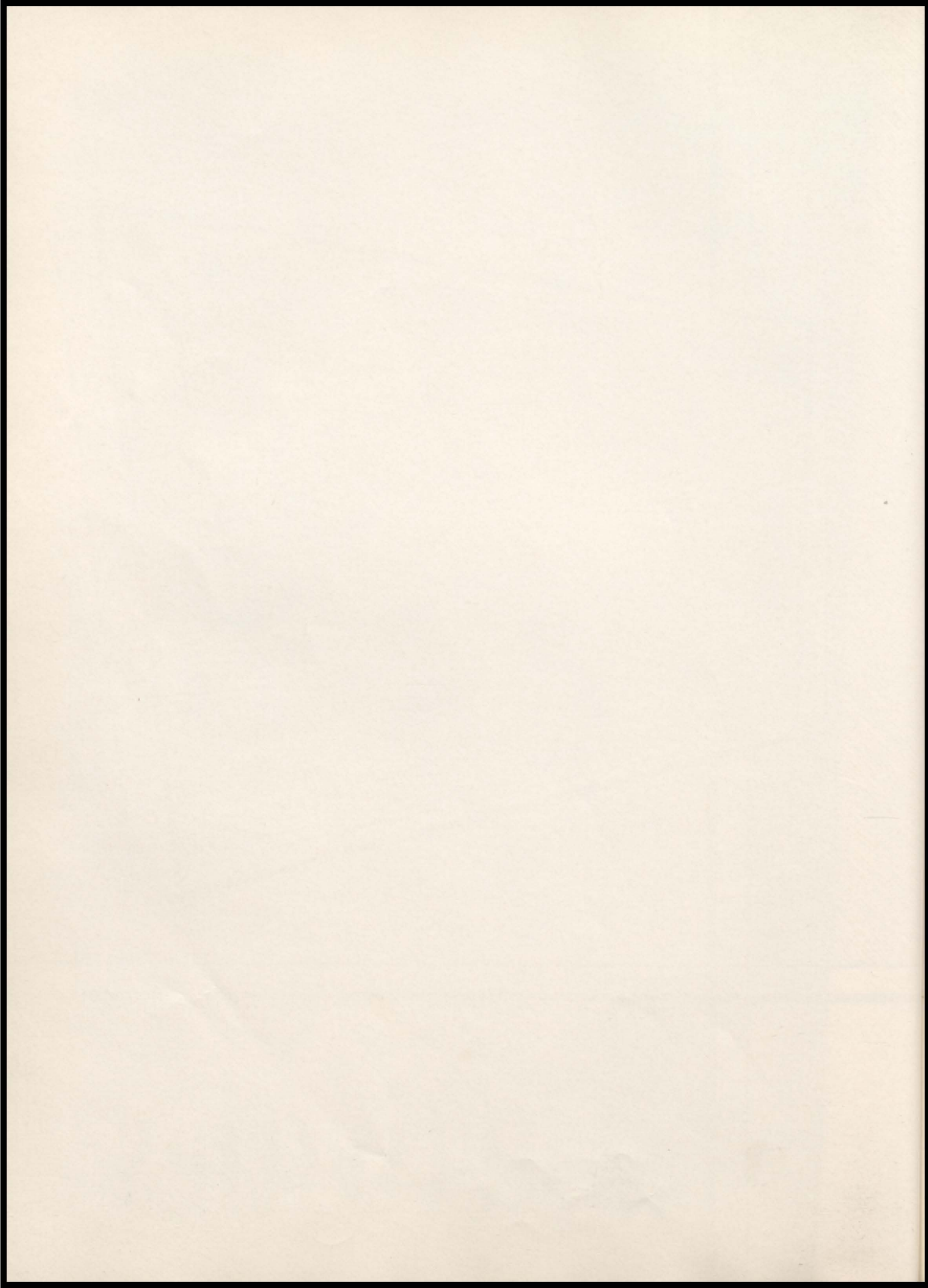
Trojans Upset Red Devils, 63-55

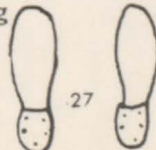

Ruthann Long was presented a certificate of award by Mrs. Inez Butler at an assembly period on Wednesday afternoon, February 6, 1957.

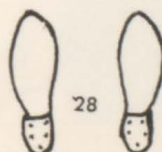

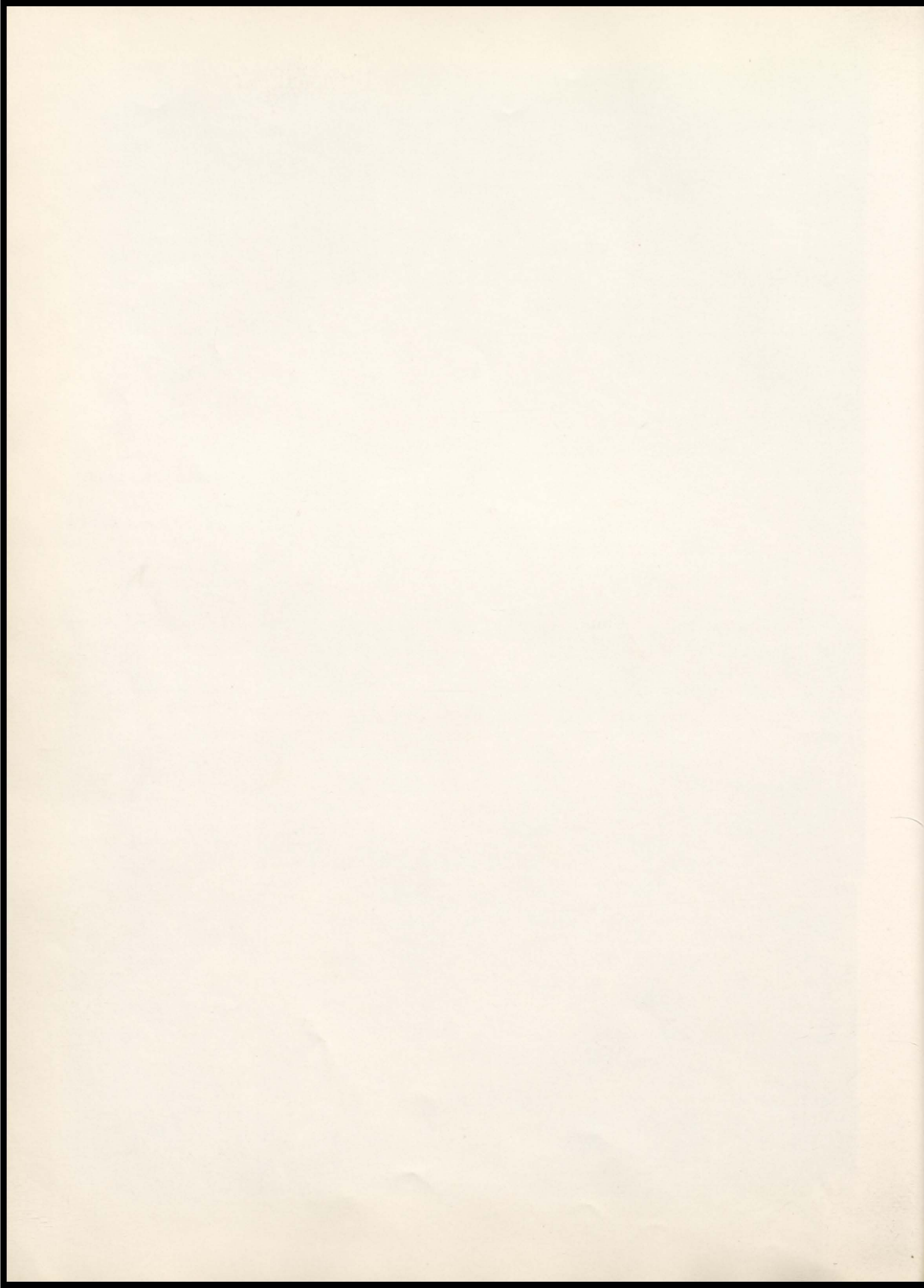
