Injuries became a jinx and the big names of Ferguson, Andrew, and others were missing as the Trojans lost to Media 27-0. In the LaHarpe game Glenn Fort was lost for the season. The Trojans lost 27-0 despite the valiant efforts of Jacob and crew.

The final game with Yorkwood found 13 men missing from the original roster but the crew of a few veterans, a bunch of Sophomores and Freshmen won 6-0. Jacob and Grady Fort were in on $51 \%$ of the tackles stopping the Big Bear attack. Long, Cargill, Kemp, Crane, and many others were great in a fine team effort.

"The foreign language department presents courses in Latin and French in a manner that will permit the student of even moderate language ability to master the fundamentals. To reach that goal means to lay the foundation for further study."

'Basic aim of the English department at Stronghurst is to help prepare all students to exist in today's modern world in which one must have a good background in the art of communication--the ability to convey his ideas through written expression as well as verbal expression.

Stress is on writing and grammar as a student must understand the language before he can accurately express himself. Supplementing this extensive writing program each student is required to read from a selected reading list, through which he can add to his vocabulary and knowledge from the vicarious experiences of others."

Mrs. Pogue's intensive efforts have helped to bring us our improved library which, having a direct correlation with all of our courses, serves to improve our grades and our desire for better literature.

## AMERICAN HISTORY

Mr. Bickell's students seldom leave his "green" room without learning about the history of our country and that of the world around us. The Berlin and Cuba crises, led by Khrushchev and Castro, provide provocative topics for discussion in democracy classes. As coach of Stronghurst's Varsity football and basketball teams, he developed modest winners and graceful losers. He instructs Driver Education and is sponsor of the Freshman Class.
"We do not teach a skill for making a better living, but means of making living better; we try to teach concern for the rights and duties of citizens of a free nation. In three or four short years our young people will be eligible to vote, to bear arms, to enter business, to create homes. They will inherit our national mistakes and problems, and will need the ability to make wise choices."


## GENERAL SCIENCE

Mr . Ramage is responsible for charting the course in our up-dated science curriculum. His class of General Science, biology, and chemistry analyze subjects from orbital flights and the splitting of atoms to the gluteus maximus of a frog. As a co-sponsor, he helps alleviate the Seniors' problems.
'Ninety percent of all the scientists who have ever lived on this planet are living today.
Because science is making such rapid advances the student is taught basic ideas and concepts rather than a jumble of facts. He learns to experiment, observe, and reason."

Mr. Blasi leads students through the sign numbers of practical math, the equations of algebra, and the complex functions and cofunctions of trigonometry. He also is a cosponsor of the Junior Class
"In the past ten years there has been a tremendous nation-wide upsurge of emphasis placed on the mathematics curriculum in high school. The new methods being emplayed at Stronghurst are not a complete revamping, but a gradual influx of new meth ods recommended by the research men in mathematics."


## FAMILY LIVING

Mrs. Pearson is the leader behind these fragrant aromas that roam the halls then our stomachs are growling and our noses twitching, trains classes in homemaking, and is responsible for the adult-education classes of her department. She also serves as cosponsor of the Senior Class and advisor of F.H.A.
"Vocational homemaking programs should prepare students for homemaking responsibilities and activities necessary for achieving family wellbeing, help family members improve the quality of their home life through effective development and utilization of human and material resources. To teach students to think for themselves, to be good managers of time, energy and money."

## TYPING

Mr. Bartlett teaches classes in personal typing, shorthand, office practice and general business. Additional duties include advising The Beacon Staff and co-sponsoring the Junior Class.
'Business education courses introduce the basic aspects of business, and an appreciation of the business man in society. In ad dition, the department aims at training for active, intelligent and responsible participation in business and community life."
