
"THE MAN BEHIND THE CURTAIN"







The second phase of our contract began in September of 1939. This year we lost two actors, Namely Abraham Good and Betty Burrell Our box office stars in this play were:



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

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
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UNDERSTUDIES OF THE 1942 STARS

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
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



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The curtain will fall on our first act May 8, 1942.





HIGHLIGHTS OF TROJAN FOOTBALL

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With the thud of the ball and the pop of the leather, the 1941 grid campaign opened. Facing a tough schedule of seven games Coach Harris had six returning lettermen from last year's Trojan eleven. Backs Bowen, Dalton, and Gilliland-and for the forward wall Stewart, Kemp, and Munson. Promising reserves from last year and a good crop of newcomers made the appearance of a good team.

The season opener with Biggsville proved that the inexperienced Trojan team would get off to a wobbly start. After holding the Red Devils of Biggsville on even terms the first half, they relinquished this lead to take a 19-6 setback.

On a rain soaked field at Monmouth the Trojans broke into the winning column at the expense of the "Little Maroons" of Monmouth High. Scoring early in the first quarter and again in the second, the Trojans took a half-time advantage of 13-0. Again in the third quarter the "Harrismen" pushed over a tally which was counteracted by a Monmouth score, The final STRONGHURST 19—MONMOUTH—O. Jack Bowen, Trojan halfback, suffered a painful back injury in this encounter.


Stronghurst came home the next week fortheir homecoming encounter with the powerful Roseville "ll". After holding the invaders to a 6-6 tie at the grarter the Trojans fellbefore a great team to suffer at 49-24 beating.

Following the Roseville encounter, the Trojans defeated the Galesburg "B" team on a rain-drenched field. Playing in a steady downpour Stronghurst managed to push over a score on a second period pass. The conversion failed and from then on the Trojans played strictly a defensive game.

Stronghurst traveled to Media to battle the rival Bulldogs on the latter's field. Stronghurst opened the scoring on a long pass from Gilliland to Bowen and converted to lead 7-0. Later on a sleeper pass Media trailed the Black and White of Stronghurst 7-6. The Trojans made several threats in the Third quarter but failed. With only two minutes remaining. The Bulldogs pushed over two hurried touchdowns to win 18-7.

Alexis set back the Trojans in a Bi-County game on the Alexis gridiron. Playing under adverse weather conditions there were many bad passes and fumbles to hinder both teams. The final Alexis-26 Stronghurst-6.

In the season finals the Trojans traveled to Industry to battle on a snowy wind-swept day. With a powerful west wind at their back the Trojans pushed over an early tally which proved the winning margin. Although several touchdown threats were made none were successful. The vistors talleyed a safety to make the final 6-2.

Whitmore and Stewart are transfer students and along with several freshmen were prospects to make it tough to get a varsity berth.

After opening the season against Oquawka with a 37-16 score, the Trojans made it two in a row against a formidable Galesburg "B" team. The locals looked very impressive in this 45-25 victory. Getting by Terre Haute was a small task, but after this game Stronghurst seemed to hit a slump and eked out the next four games by only slim margins The Trojans entered the K. M. B. S. tourney with a string of 7 wins.

In the opening encounter of the Holiday Tournament at Biggs-ville the Trojans quintet had little trouble in getting past a small team from the hest school. Media downed Kirkwood in the next game on the opening night. In the "Championship Game" with the Bulldogs of Media, the Trojans forged ahead late in the game to annex the gold trophy. This marked the first time in the history of the tournament that it had been won twice in a row by any school.

Stronghurst made it 10 in a row with a 40-32 victory over Kirk-wood but dropped the next encounter to the Media cagers on the visitors court. This was the first setback of the season for S.H.S. But the Trojans hit their stride and "mowed down" Biggsville twice, Colusa and Western Academy to enter the Bi-County Tourney with a record second to none.

Stronghurst eliminated Alexis easily to the score of 39-15 in a semi-final game after drawing a bye in the first round. In the "title tilt" with Roseville the locals lost a close game 27-20. This marked the second consecutive year that the locals had lost the Bi—County Championship by a small margin. The Heavyweights "brought home the bacon" in their division.

Stronghurst marched through their own District Tourney in fine fashion with consecutive wictories over Media, Kirkwood, and Blandinsville which gave them the championship, and the right to enter the Regional tourney held at Monmoush.

The Trojans faced a tough task in the Regional Tourney in getting by Macomb and Monmouth before reaching the finals. But nothing

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Was to much for the Trojans. They took the Orange and Black from Macomb 42-31 and the Monmouth "5" 35-31. This brought the Trojans and the Purple Panthers of Roseville together for the second consecutive year for the Championship. The Roseville quintet was too much for the Harrismen of Stronghurst and won the title 49-31.

For the second time in as many years the Trojans entered into sectional play. This year they met the powerful Chinks from Pekin and were subdued 52-34. The Pekin crew were definitely the superior team but never-the-less the Trojans put up a great battle. This left the 41-42 cage squad from Stronghurst with an impressive record of 25 wins against 4 losses.

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












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This year, as usual, the Stronghurst G. A. A. is an affiliated member of the Illinois League of High School Girls' Athletic Association.

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Time was when girls studied "Domestic Science"—consisting mainly of a study of foods and clothing. The modern Homemaking department however, is quite different in that it offers work in all
of home living. This is in recognition of the fact that making a
home involves much more than the construction of clothing or the
preparation of food. Units which are offered in such a course include housing, family and social relationships, budgeting of time
and money, child care and the basic skills involved in foods and
clothing.

Homemaking for boys was again offered this year and in February the Vocation Homemaking and Vocational Agriculture classes were exchanged for a period of five weeks. The boys' course included units in foods, clothing, manners and social customs; while the girls spent their time in woodworking. Although the time was short for the material to be covered, it was a worthwhile experience.

Home projects are carried out during second semester and during summer vacations. These projects are definitely related to the needs of the girl and necessarily cover a wide variety of activities.

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FFUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA

The Vocational Agriculture Department of the Future Farmers of America is an active organization. It practices the motto of Learning by Doing, thus it has set up a group of services which it willingly performs for the farmers and citizens of the community.

Some of these services are as follows: analysis of unknowns, balancing rations, delousing boultry, building soil conserving dams, milk testing, testing seeds for germination planting and landscaping, boultry culling, pruning trees, and testing soil.

Some of the things which the boys have done in classes to further their ability and education is the making of public speeches in class once a week, writing news articles of interest to the general public, and constructing a feed sample loard giving all available information on the feeds displayed.

One of the spring activities of the department is the develop ment of judging teams Last spring the Fat Stock Team was composed of Lee Saben, Harold Kemp, Raymond West, Charles Avery, and Earl Booton. The poultry Team was composed of Earl Booton and Howard Stimpson. Other teams were the Grain Team with Jack Dixon, Donald McIntyre, Charles Avery, and Bob Bjork as members, and the Dairy Team made up of Paul Hartman and Paul Schroeder. These teams judged at only one contest last spring, the Kirkwood KMBS judging contest The Fat Stock and Poultry Teams were each successful in winning second place honors. An individual award was made to Earl Booton who topped all poultry judges and came home with the first place ribbon for his outstanding judging performance.

By far the greatest emphasis in the griculture department is placed on projects as vocational education such as agriculture is actually learning by doing as is brought in the F F.A. motto. During the last year projects have been up to expectations but with the Food For Freedom program now in "full swing" the boys are doing there humble part to do their share by carrying an extensive project projects sophomore boys to carry at least three projects, junior boys to carry at least five projects. at the present time there are 39 projects and 19 long term projects which are well under way. These projects will not only make a handsome profit for the boys, but will also aid in establishing them in farming when they are ready to begin their life's work.

The F.F.A. ended the year with a total membership of 24. The organization was in the hands of very capable officers with the following boys in charge: Harold Kemp, President; Leslie Stewart, Vice President; Howard Stimpson, Treasurer; Paul Hartman, Secretary; Bob Martin, Reporter; Donald Lord, Student Council Member; and Mr. George Richter, Adviser.



VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE PROFITS OF 1941

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During the year beginning February 1, 1941 and ending January 31, 1942, 22 boys in vocational agriculture completed 31 different livestock and crop projects. The total clear profit on these projects was \$4610.22 or an average profit per boy of \$209.55. The boy allowed themselves \$500.60 for their labor, which brought the student's labor and management earnings to \$5111.22 for the 22 boys. The average net profit per project was \$148.72.

The largest and most profitable group of projects were again the swine projects in which 14 boys owned and cared for 42 sows and 241 pigs. A total of 46,010 pounds of pork was produced with a net profit of \$3235.25. Approximately 72% of the total project income from shows was won by the boys with swine projects. A total of \$70.60 was dericed from show premiums.

Four beby beef calves were carried as projects by two boys. The total production of beef was 2,638 pounds which showed a profit of \$83.29. Thirteen ewes and 14 lambs were carried as projects by four boys, producing 863 pounds of lamb and realizing a profit of \$139.97 One boy carried 4 purebred dairy heifers for a project and enjoyed a profit of \$223.21. Only one boy carried poultry as a project, netting him \$10.07.

Five boys carried a secondary project of corn, producing 3055 bushels per acre. A total profit on this corn was \$878.55. Four boys also carried potatoes as a project, producing 95½ bushels on a total of 7/8 of an acre and realizing a profit of \$112.50.

In general, vocational agriculture at Stronghurst enjoyed a very successful year. It might be well brought out that vocational agriculture is not only profitable from the educational standpoint but also from the financial standpoint as far as the boys are concerned.

1941-1942 PROJECTS

There are twenty-three boys enrolled in the two agriculture courses this year. These boys are carrying a total of 39 projects with 19 long term projects. Swine is again the most popular project with 13 boys oning 38 sows and litters along with 56 feeder pigs. One boy has 2 purebred dairy cows, one heifer, and calves. Five boys have 20 ewes and lambs, 2 boys have 5 baby beef calves, and 5 boys are raising corn, six raising potatoes, and two raising gardens for projects. In general, the boys are doing their part in producing a vital agricultural products our Nation is needing.



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A HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE F. F. A.

The courses in vocational agriculture under the National Vocation Education Act were first established in the United States in 1917. From the very beginning, the boys in these classes, in the various states, felt a spirit of couradeship due to their background of country life and their desire to farm.

Within a few years, a number of organizations composed of voca- tional agriculture students were established and called "Agricultural Clubs."

These vocational agriculture clubs grew in numbers, their successes and failures pointing toward a group action. Some of the early clubs were called "Junior Farmers", "Young Farmers", and "Future Farmers". The "Future Farmers of Virginia" was the first effort for a whole group action.

The Future Farmers of America was then brought forth in 1927. The country was ready, the time was ribe. From coast-to-coast, similar organizations sprung up. The pattern was taken from the "Future Farmers of Virginia." Illinois, our home state, was the twenty-first to become a member of the national organization.

Agriculture was first taught here at S. H. S. in 1926. In October 23, 1930, only three years after the national organization was formed the charter for the Stronghurst Chapter of the Future Farmers of America was received.

Today, the F.F.A., which is considered by many to be the strongest youth organization in America, is spread over the whole United States, in Hawaii, Puerto Pico, and in foreign countries. There are forty-nine state chapters in all, with many local chapters and all have but one single interest--Agriculture.

THE NATIONAL EMBLEM OF THE F. F. A.

The National Emblem of the Future Farmers of America is significant and meaningful in every detail. Used by members in all recognized units of the organization, it is made up of five symbols: the owl, the plow, and the rising sun, within the cross section of an ear of corn, which is surmounted by the American Eagle. Upon the face of the emblem appear the words, "Vocational Agriculture" and the letters "F. F. A." The owl is symbolic of wisdom and knowledge; the plow is the symbol of labor and tillage of the soil; the rising sun is emblematic of progress and the new day that will dawn when all farmers are trained and have learned to cooperate; the cross section of an ear of corn represents common agriculture interests since corn is native to America and is grown in every state; and the eagle is indicative of the national scope of the organization.
