Neff, Charlotte Opie, Milton Pearson, Bonnie J. Peterson, Dyke Shook, Don Shult, Naomi Seins, Don Smith, Richard Stimpson, Wayne Stimpson, Pauline Strand, and Ray Williams. To us, the biggest event of the year was our being initiated into SHS on October 1. After the day of torture we were rewarded by the customary party given by the Sophomores. Another high light of the year was the Freshman stunt, "Quiet Please" given at Homecoming for the Senior Stunt Night. Those taking part were Max Carner, Don Johnson, James Hess, Dorothy Brokaw, Russell Davison, Jewell Mason, Joyce Chipman, and Charles Ferguson.

Our candidates for king and queen were Don Smith and Jewell Mason.

Early in the year we lost Ray Williams and at the end of the first semester we lost Don Dalton. Late in February Milton Pearson, and Richard Stimpson left us.

In May, we, with the Seniors entertained the Sophomores, Juniors and Faculty at a picnic given in the Lab. due to the rainy weather. Thus ended the career of the Freshmen of forty-four.

After a long vacation we met once again on August 28, 1944 as Sophomores. We found that we had lost Don Shult, James Hess, Bonnie Peterson, Jean Keith, and Wayne Stimpson, but we had gained Miriam O'May.

We met with Miss Droste and Mr. O'May, our advisors, to choose our officers for this year. They were:

For stunt night this year we gave a Hawiian scene in which everyone participated. Our candidates for king and queen were Ronnie Stamp and Charlotte Opie.

A big event was the initiating of the Freshmen into SHS. The first tradition we broke was being the first Sophomore Class to present a Class Play. It was held on Tuesday Evening, February 13, 1946 under the very capable direction of Miss Elaine Droste. The cast of characters included in the "Old School Spirit" were:

The cast presented Miss Droste with a bouquet of roses.

We cleared over \$80 on the play which was used for the Junior-Senior Banquet the following year.

After the play Miriam O'May left to go to another school. Bubs Annegers, Vice-President took her place as our President. In the spring we were happy to welcome Raleigh Smith and Iona Tee.

We closed the year with a picnic given in our honor by the Freshmen at Crapo Park.

On August 27, 1945 we returned once again to SHS, this time as "Jolly Juniors." As the roll was called we found that we had lost Rolly Smith, Iona Tee, and Noami Seins. We had gained Bill Overman and Mary Lou Bartlett. Mary Lou left at the end of the first semester. Mr. Tingley and Mrs. Mortimer were our advisors this year For our officers we elected:

On November 16, 1945 we presented our class play for this year; a farce in three acts — "Professor, How Could You?" — which was given under the direction of Mr. Carl E. Tingley and assisted by Miss Madoline Goetz. The plot was as follows:

His friend, John offers him his secretary, Grandma, a girl who can cook, etc. Grandpa won't tell his candidate, but the prefessor married her — a girl student who caused him many a headache, but not before many mixups with the other candidates. A large crowd was in attendance. The cast presented Miss Goetz with roses and Mr. Tingley with a billfold.

We sold the food at the basketball games during the winter and a nice profit was derived from it.

We probably started ourselves as "sophisticated Seniors" much earlier than any other class to leave SHS, for in the summer we sponsored the bake sale in June at Regans for which we received about \$20. In July came our first big money making affair of the year. July 6 we sponsored a fish fry on the East lawn of the school. We made over \$100 on this. Then came the fair. We had a stand next to the arena, and for three days, in the rain and the mud, we worked to be rewarded with \$120.

September 3 brought us back to school for the last year. We were sorry to have lost Jewell Mason, Ray Marshall, and Dean Mc-Intyre, but we regained Bonnie J. Peterson and also Claude Cunningham. Bonnie was married before the year was over.

During the football season we had charge of a food stand. Late in September we held an ice cream social in the Lab. Around \$50 was made on this. Then, in Oct. came a big event. We, as Seniors, sponsored the Homecoming Dance. Our candidates for King and Queen were Don Johnson, and Bubbles Annegers. They were crowned King and Queen of the 1946 Homecoming. Over \$100 was cleared on this event.

In Nov. we had a box supper. Although there weren't many present, all had a good time. Here we made \$30.

Dec. 28 found us sponsoring the Annual Christmas Dance. The gym was beautifully decorated with the festive decorations. A large tree stood in the center of the stage with pretty lights, poinsettas, and mistletoe all around. Freeling Clower furnished us with wonderful dance music. Although we didn't any more than break even, we considered it one of the successes of the year.

On Jan. 29, despite the terrible storm, we proceeded with our plans for the piano concert that was given by Mr. Le Roy F. Stadtlander, blind pianist of Burlington. We cleared \$25.

During the District Tourney in February, we were glad to be able to sell food in the Lab. Thanks to the large crowd, we made over \$100.

On May 29, we presented class night for the public. It took the audience up to 1970 where the class of '47 was meeting in the old gym at SHS for a reunion.

On June 1, Baccalaureate was held in the gymnasium, Rev. Dahlquist of the Lutheran Church gave the adress. We wore our caps and gowns for the first time tonight. They were Northwestern purple. The Sophomores did a wonderful job of decorating.

Monday, June 2, found us with the Freshman, entertaining the Sophomores, Juniors, and Faculty with our all school picnic.

At last the night so long awaited for came. June 3rd marked the end of our high school career. As we marched down the aisle, we realized that we were bidding goodbye to SHS but the memories of it will be with us always. Eight of us had gone to school together for twelve years; namely — Bonnie Jeanne Clark, Ruth Corley, Charlotte Opie, Dorothy Brokaw, Edith Patty Sanderson, Ronnie Stamp, Donald Johnson, and Russell Davison.

June 9th, we departed on our long-awaited trip for which we had worked so hard. We came home and told each other goodbye, each wondering whether we would all meet together again or not. And now we were ready to start our lifetime journey, what ever be the outcome.

The first event which is considered important was our initiation. With our garb on we paraded through main street and out to the football field. However, all of us were good sports and soon became affiliated members of S. H. S.


Our candidates for King and Queen at the Homecoming were Helen Shafer and Jack Harsch.

The parties which we had included were the Freshman Sopho more party and a hayrack party. We also participated in the magazine selling contest.






