Coming back our sophomore year, we gave the freshman a initiation party in revenge for the one we had given us by the juniors.




Our advisors were Miss Olson and Mr. Hunt.

We were all active in everything that went on aroundus. Our first year was closed by giving a picnic for the sophomores at Crapo Park.


We were soon back at school but this time as "silly" sophomores. We were now a class of thirty-five.


Decorations on the dinner tables include white carnation bouquets, the senior class flower and white and blue nut cups,






To commemorate National F.H.A. week we put flowers in the different churches. We also planned to plant red rose bushes near the school in the spring.


Our chapter sponsored the "Ralph Pierce Magic Show" in January. It was a top performance and keenly enjoyed by those present.

We have entered the Chapter Contest and are hoping to win in our section of 18 schools. We placed second last year and can do better this year.









The band and choral groups presented themselves in the first public concert appearance of the year on November 9th during National Education Week observance.


Handel's Messiah was performed by the Stronghurst Community Chorus composed of adult and high school student members on Bunday, December 5, 1948.

Rehearsal was scheduled during the latter part of Faboratory and all of March for the Various groups entering annual Illinois High School Association Music Contest.




