Well, really I did not know how to begin this letter because it is hard to express how thankful I am for all the beautiful seconds you gave to my life. I will never forget the first day when I arrived here nor the welcome inspire of my not knowing this language. I'll always remember the funny way in which I learned the word "scare". Of course one of the students scared me and after that he said to me: "this is scare" ha, ha. I will remember too when we had conversations, the topics (in which I believed you were going to tease me, however you did not and in opposition you paid attention and put consideration in it), the lunch hours, or better the lunch minutes, Joe's jokes, and everything. Once I did not know how to pronounce the word "Jaws" and I said Joe in my speech, his face became really red and his eyes were big. With all my love, your friend and sister from Panama.


SOCIAL CONSUMER DRIVERS





The Resource Room provides assistance to students who have been identified as having special needs within the educational process. It is a combination resource and instructional program. The resource room teachers provide supportive help to students in the regular classroom, and tutorial services to students as needed. Instruction and replacement instruction programming is offered for most classes.

We have one blind student at our school, Kristy Bielser. This year during Kristy's sophomore year her subjects have included: Biology, English, Consumer Education, Typing, Foods & Nutrition, Health, PE, and Chorus. Most of her textbooks and special materials are loaned to her through a state library in Springfield. If the material isn't available they are taped or brailled for her at the high school. She does all of her homework in braille and then it is translated into print for her teachers.
