






The math program was changed this year with the drop of the Introduction to MicroComputers class. This class will hopefully be offered again next year.





Exploring The Living And Non-Living World





When bowling was through and the weather became nice again, the classes went outside. The boys stayed in shape by playing softball and doing some running while the girls did aerobics and ran.






Teachers Meet Students Needs




My first year at Union has been filled with many exciting events. I have enjoyed meeting and working with the students, faculty, administration, and Board of Education at Union High School.

Varsity Yank's Finish Second In Conference




Spring Sports Banquet
