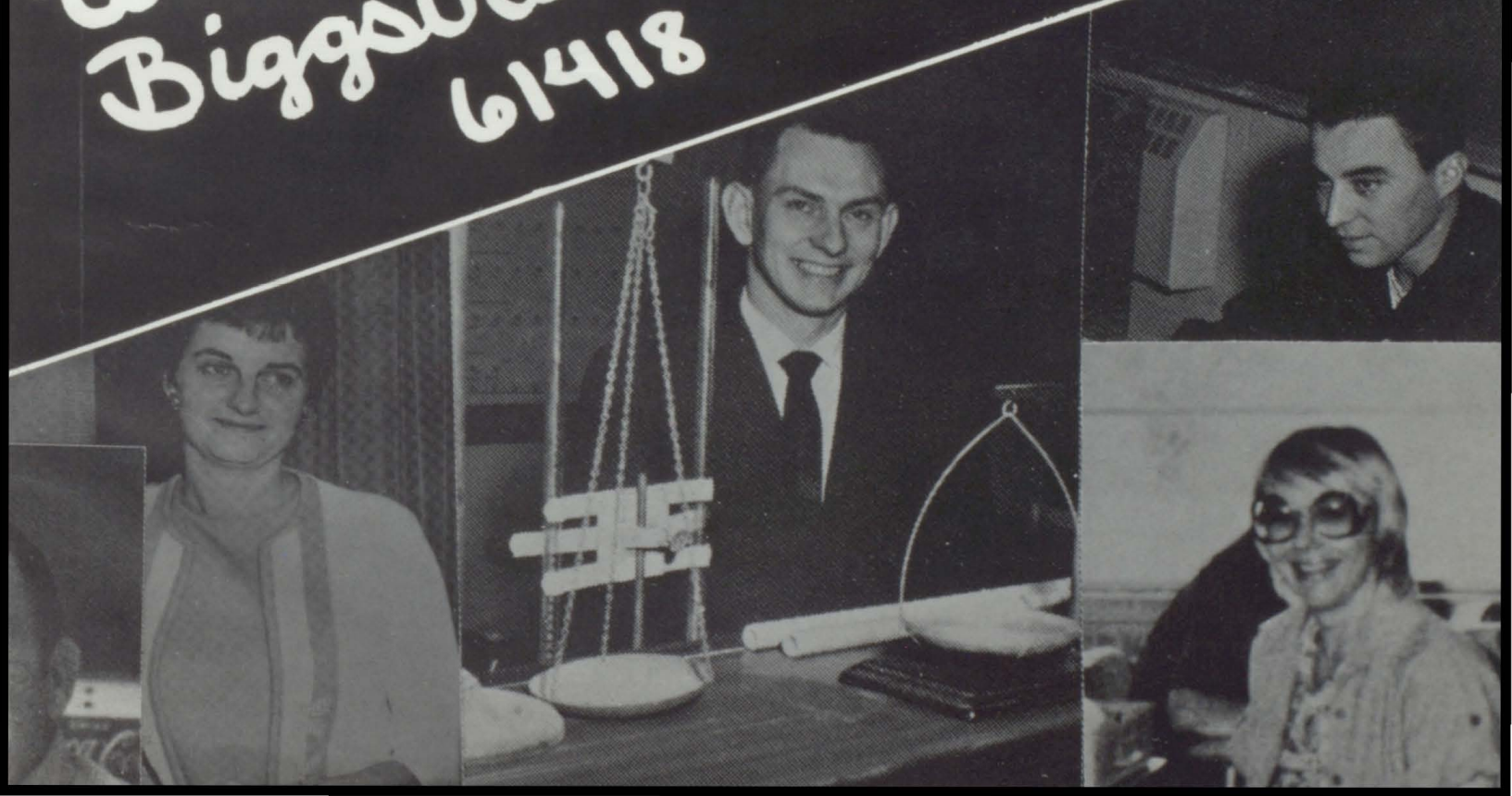
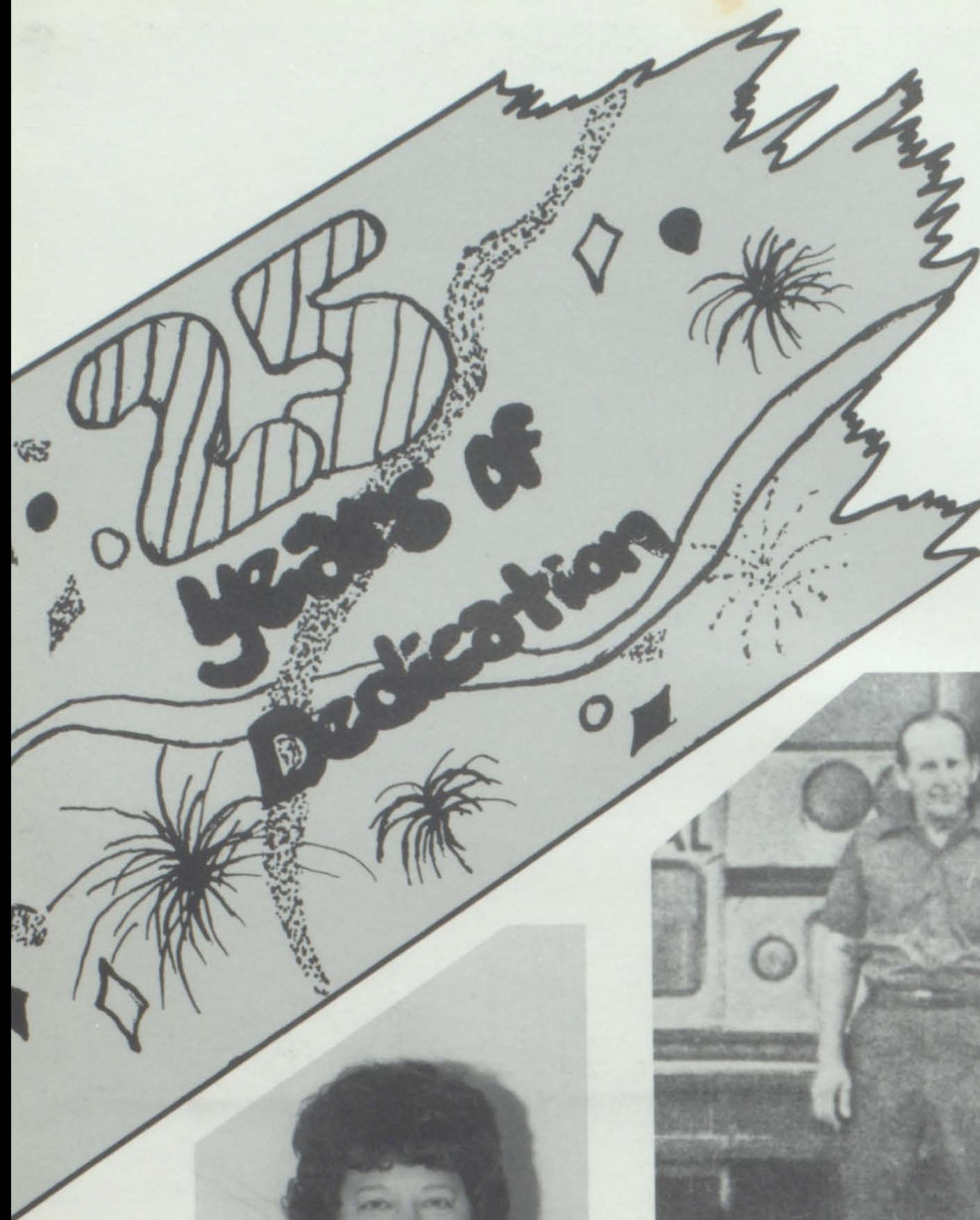

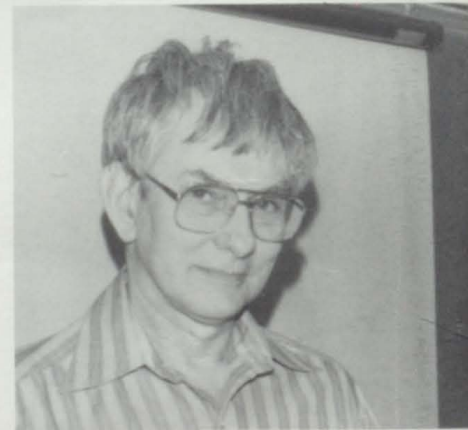
Mr. Dale Olson worked here for 14½ years. He may have not been here for the whole 25 years but he was a very dedicated worker.

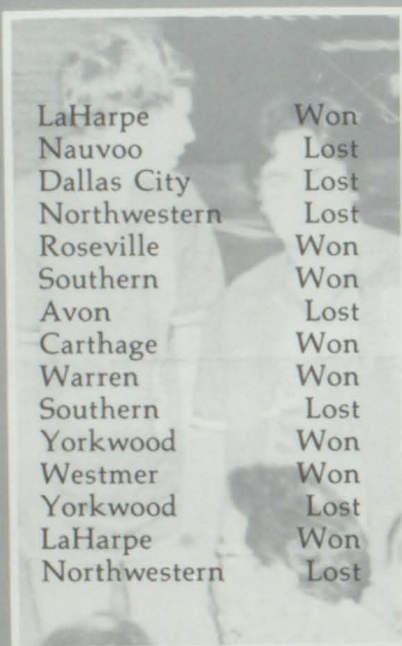
Although our record reflected a disappointing season, the squad worked hard throughout the season and maintained a very good attitude that exemplified maturity and sportsmanship as athletes.

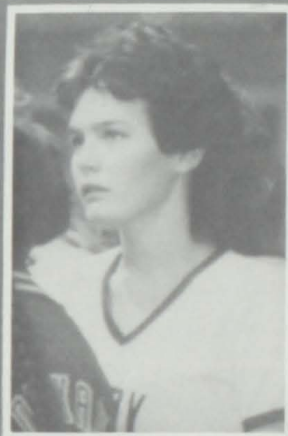

The Union Yankee boys track squad started their season to March 4th, and on the 14th at the Macomb Indoor Invitational Meet at W.I.U., Joe Bigger won the shot put event with a put of 53 feet 4-3/4 inches to break his own Union High School record. Ten days later the squad traveled to Monmouth College to participate in the Frostbite Open, where the entire squad turned in good performances, an indication of the season to come. After losing the first home meet to Westmer, the Yankees won their remaining home meets, in addition to all of the away duel and triangular meets but one. The Union boys beat the Southern Rebels three separate times by scores of 85 to 57, 84 to 66, and 75 to 67. At the Keokuk Relays on April 14, Joe Bigger won the shot put event with a toss of 52 feet 11-3/4 inches, beating out competitors from Burlington,

Keokuk, Quincy Hannibal and 15 other schools; Joe also won the shot put at the Green Dragon Invitational meet in Aledo, the Bi-County meet at Monmouth College, and the Roseville Relays, in addition to qualifying for the State meet in Charleston by winning the event at the Sectional in Dunlap on May 17. The Fresh/Soph squad was edged out of second place by one point in the Bi-County Conference Meet in Roseville. The squad picked up points in every event but the 200 meter dash and the shot put, and the 4 x 400 meter relay team of Darren

James, Andy Dunn, John Olson, and Derek Reid set a new record in the event with a time of 3:48.9 minutes, breaking the old record of 3:52.9 minutes set by Southern in 1974.

At the Varisty Bi-County Conference meet, point getters included Joe Bigger, Andy Dunn, Derek Reid, John Olson, Mark Alexander, Darren James, Rusty Decker, John Weis, and David Green. At Roseville on May 13, the Yankee squad came in fifth out of 15 schools. Joe Bigger missed breaking the shot put record by one-inch. 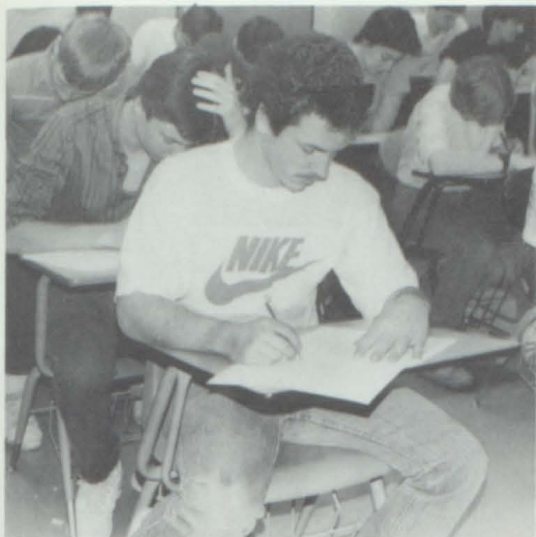

The chapter had one member who received The State Farmer Degree. That member was Dennis East. His project was fruit and vegetable production.

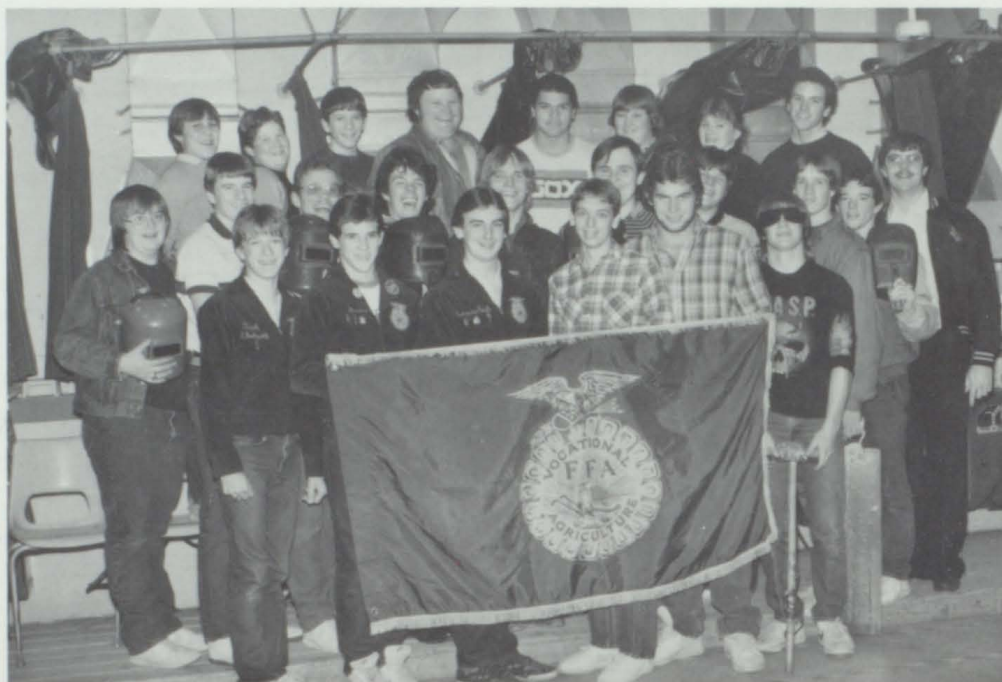

Student Council Celebrates 25 Years

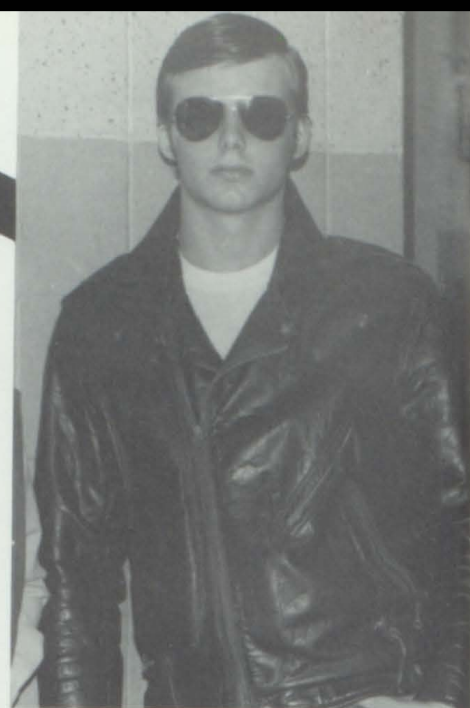

1960 — In this year the birth control pill was invented. This changed the moral, social, and cultural values of America and the rest of the world. Our president was Dwight D. Eisenhower.

1961 — John F. Kennedy took the presidency of the U.S.

1962 — John Glenn was the first U.S. astronaut to orbit earth.

1963 — President J.F. Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas, Texas, grieving the American citizens.

1964 — Vietnam finally entangled the U.S. in the war of Southeast Asia, when North Vietnam patrol boats attacked the U.S. destroyers.

1965 — U.S. Marines were sent to Dominican Republic to prevent a communist takeover during the civil war terms of time of

1966 — An oil spill ruining beaches, killing wildlife, and causing the air to be unbreathable rallied many Americans to environmental issues.

1967 — Mick Jagger drove the Rolling Stones to stardom with a blend of showmanship and hard-rocked Chicago held the

1969 — Neil Armstrong and Edwin Aldrin made the first landing on the moon. Richard Nixon took office as President of the U.S.

1973 — Formal peace accords were signed in Paris by North and South Vietnam, the U.S. and the National Liberation Front, ending

twelve years of involvement of the U.S. in the Vietnam war.

1974 — President Nixon, under threat of impeachment for obstruction of justice, became the first U.S. President to resign. Vice President

Gerald Ford assumes presidency giving Nixon a full pardon.

1975 — U.S. spacecraft Apollo and Soviet spacecraft Soyuz link in space — unifying their cooperation.

1976 — U.S. spacecraft — Viking 1 makes first successful landing on Mars. The 200th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence

July 4th was the Bicentennial.

1977 — President Jim Carter, Jr. is elected into office. The movie *Star Wars* appeared for the first time.

1978 — U.S. space shuttle Enterprise makes its first test flight atop a Boeing. *Rocky* won the best picture Oscar in the 49th annual award

of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences in Los Angeles. The Enterprise made its first successful flight landing in the

Mojave Desert.

1979 — The Dallas Cowboys defeat the Denver Broncos, 27-10, in Super Bowl XII. U.S. launches Venus 2. On May 20th, the U.S.

launched a spacecraft to orbit Venus. Iranians siezed the U.S. Embassy, took hostages, and demanded the U.S. return of the

ousted Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi, who was in a U.S. hospital on November 4. On the 19th of November, Iran released 13 of

the hostages.

1980 — Iranian officials discussed release of the U.S. hostages. U.S. broke diplomatic relations with Iran and ended exports to that

country. April 25th — a hostage rescue attempt was called off in an Iranian desert. Eight crewmen died in a helicopter transport

plane accident. July 11th — Iran freed hostage Richard Queen, who had multiple sclerosis. John Lennon of the Beatles was shot

1981 — President Ronald Reagan took office. Iran freed 52 hostages after 444 days of captivity. The price of postage stamps went from 15¢

to 18¢! President Reagan was shot in the chest, Press Secretary James Brady and two security officers were also wounded. John W.

Hinckley was arrested at the scene.

1982 — U.S. space shuttle Columbia flies its third mission. *Chariots of Fire* won the Oscar as best picture. President Reagan proposes that

the U.S. and Russia reduce the number of nuclear missile warheads.

1983 — Walter Mondale announced his candidacy for the 1984 Democratic presidential nomination. The final episode of "M*A*S*H"

attracted more U.S. viewers that any single program in history. *Return of the Jedi* grossed a record \$6.2 million on its opening

day. The first minority to seek the presidency was Reverend Jesse Jackson.

1984 — Challenger astronauts fly free in space without a lifeline to their spacecraft. Challenger astronauts complete history's first

satellite repair in space. Discovery astronauts retrieve two satellites, misfired in February, for repairs.

1985 — President Reagan was reelected. Rock Hudson died at the age of 59 from the infectious disease AIDS. After 100 years, Coke

changed its formula with bad results.

1986 — A FARM AID concert was held at Champaign with several students and faculty attending.

Lady Liberty was restored.

Haleys Comet passed our way again as it does every 76 years.

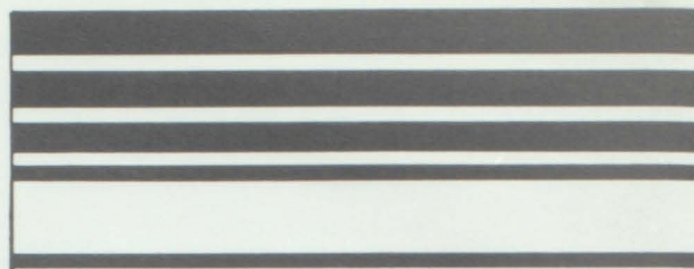

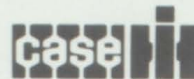
