School Board

The 1991-92 school year has been a combination of anticipation, frustration, hope and resolve for the Union School Board.

Our attempt to start the year as scheduled failed because of asbestos abatement and resulting repair/replacement at the high school not being completed on time. This resulted in the board acting to change the school calendar to end the school year on June 8th instead of June 3rd.

Also, in addition to normal board business has been the responsibility of the new elementary school in progress. Along with enthusiasm has been much decision making. This resulted in an extra board meeting each month being set to deal with those issues. Regardless of the "rise and falls" and change orders along the way, we are continually assured that everything is on schedule and the building will be ready to occupy for the 1992-93 school year. School Board walk through is scheduled for mid June. An open house is also being planned.

A committee was appointed to initiate disposal of the old elementary buildings as they are vacated. We are pleased that one building has already been sold pending legalities.

Two new buses have been bought to help meet the district's needs for additional transportation next year as bus routes change. Thanks to the efforts of Q-Club the district has been able to maintain extra curricular activities this year.

The board acted to reinstate Industrial Arts at the high school level for the 1992-93 school year. The board also acted to update/repair equipment for the computer class at the high school. P.E. credit has been changed to $\frac{1}{2}$ credit per semester beginning with 1992-93 school year. This will affect each class differently in credits and graduation requirements.



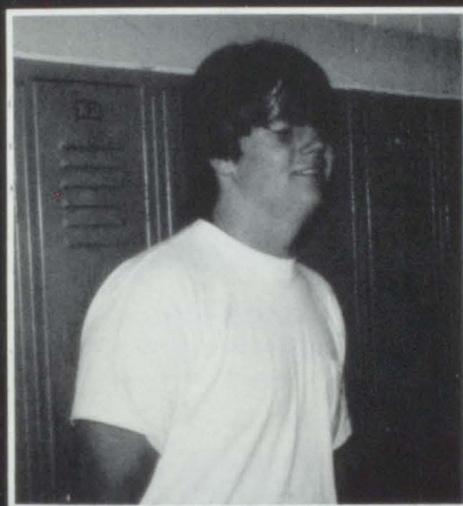
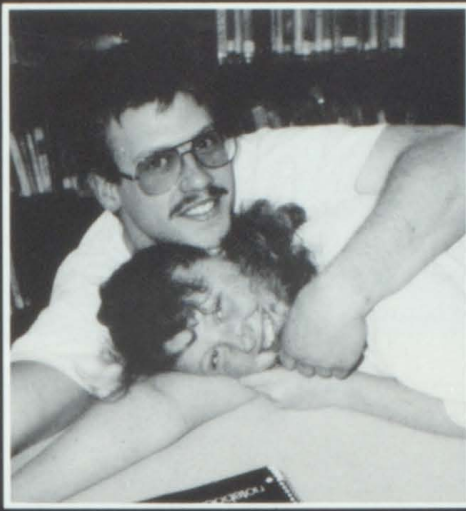

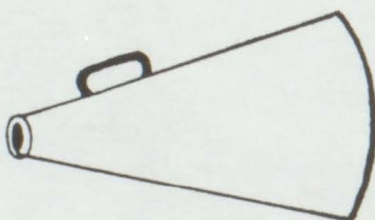

The 1991-92 UHS boys' junior varsity basketball team suffered through a frustrating season, but gained fundamentals and experience for the future.

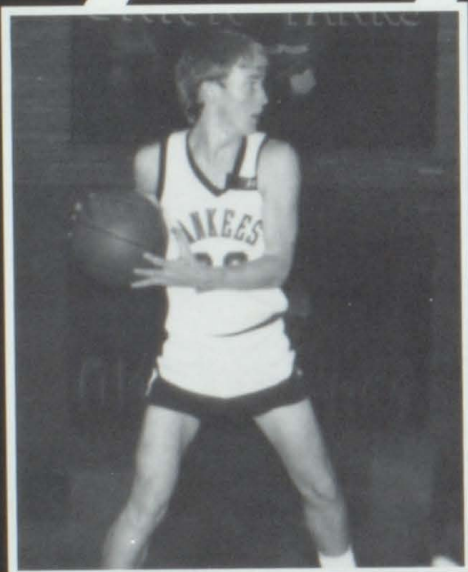

Sophomores John Martinez (14.1 ppg) and Shawn Parsons (8.3 ppg) provided UHS with solid leadership and consistent play all season.



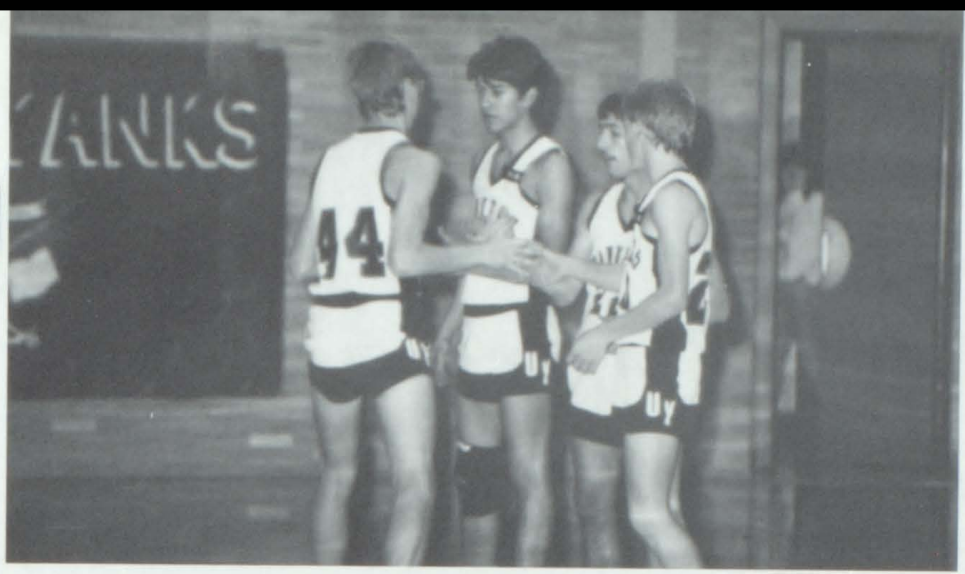

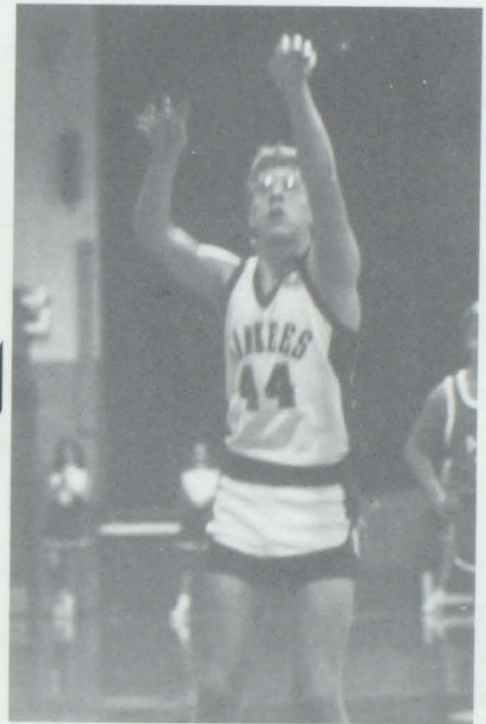

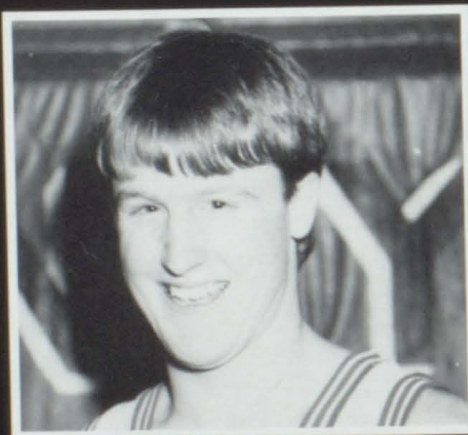

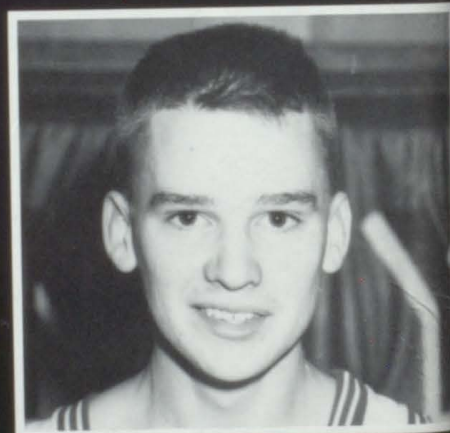

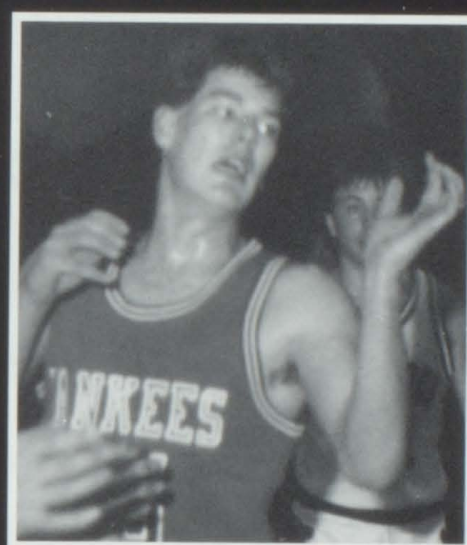

Coach Flater was satisfied with the track team of fourteen, but hopes to have more students out next year.



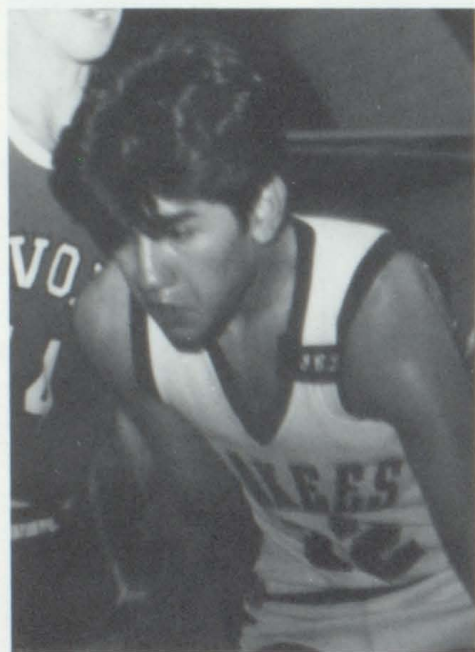

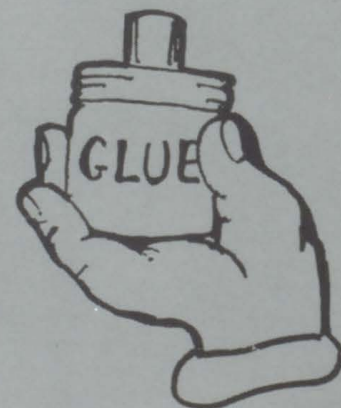

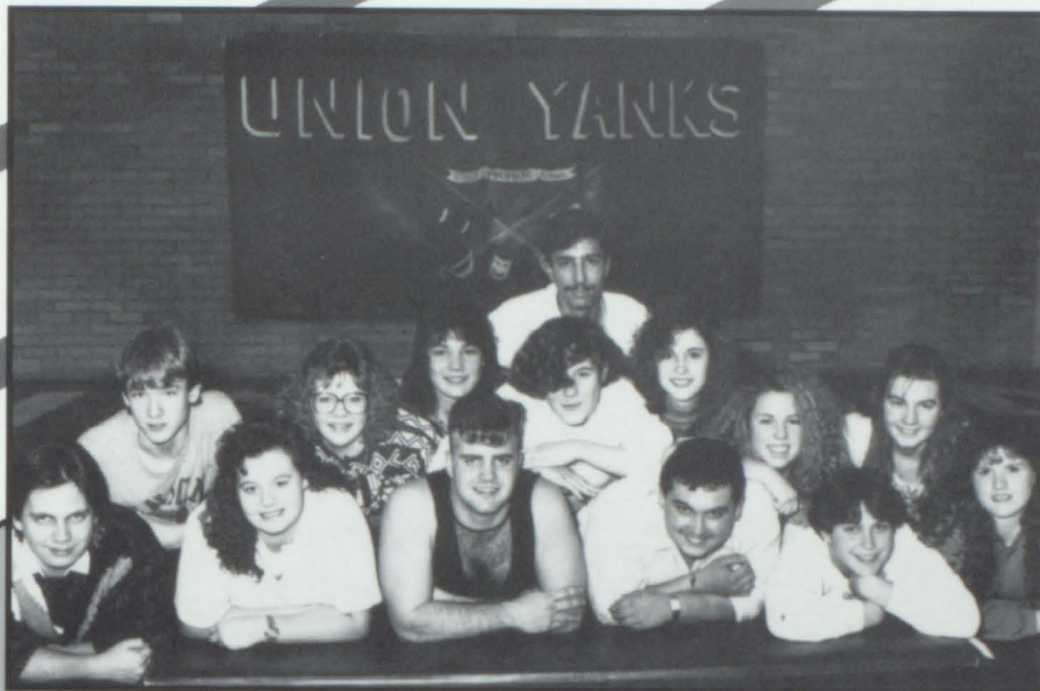

The Union High School Math Club has been competing since 1979 by taking six contests furnished by the Illinois Mathematics League. A ladder competition is held among our own students based on these results. Awards are given to the top five students, along with awards for top senior, junior, sophomore, and freshman. Each contest has six very difficult questions. These are taken during homeroom.

This year the Union High School Math Club has 41 members. The top eight students in the Math Club are Carey Carrier with 10 correct, Cindy Frank with 8 correct, Kendra Thompson and Stacie Emery with 7 correct, Katrina Lajunen, Kari Bailey, Jay Fude, and Keri Palazzo with 6 correct. The top senior was Katrina Lajunen, top junior was Cindy Frank, top sophomore was Carey Carrier, and top freshman was Carl Droste with 4 correct.

Each year some members of the Math Club go to the ICTM Mathematics Contest, at Western Illinois University. The total team consisted of 21 students: four freshman, seven sophomores, five juniors, and five seniors.

Our top: Algebra I was Carl Droste, Geometry students were Shelly Russell and Stacy Pilkington, Algebra II student was Carey Carrier, and Pre-Calculus was Kelly Meyer. Chad Pierce and Kelly Meyer scored a record 17 points in the Junior-Senior Two Person Team Competition.

JETS (Junior Engineering Technical Society) Team consists of fourteen students. Each student takes two examinations. This gives each school four students in the following subjects: English, mathematics, chemistry, biology, physics, graphics, and computers. The top two scores from each school for each subject represent the team score. Union attends the District Contest at Carl Sandburg College, in Carthage, Illinois.

If a team or individual places first or second, they advance to a Regional Contest at Western Illinois University. Placing first or second at WIU advances a team or individual to a state contest.

On February 4, 1992 the District JETS Contest was held. Union came in third place with a total of 409 points only 2.9 points behind Hamilton. Shelly Russell tied for second place in Biology and qualified to compete at the Regional JETS Contest on Feb. 27, 1992.

Students worked on marching techniques, but primarily concentrated on concert music.



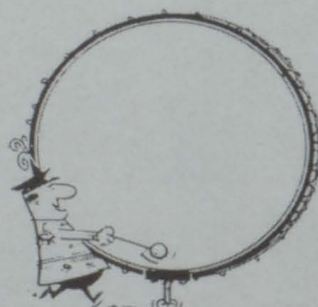
