And family and all those who know them, especially their friends.


Their lives have touched so many the list doesn't end.

Tonight you spoke the words I feel, God used your voice to say.




We all miss Chad dearly and we will continue to think of him often and to treasure his gifts always.








As our final year comes to an end, we will have the realization that in these past four years, the memories will never be forgotten.




ADMINISTRATION






J. V. Football

















All of the art students should be congratulated on their hard work and enthusiasm that they contributed to not only Union, but to the community as well.






