
Through the Years






Taking Great Strides





























The Christmas concert was pulled off with flying colors. The year will end with a spring concert. The year has been a blast and no complaints on the progress should be made.








The choir had a very productive season this year. They held the annual Christmas concert and performed with students in the elementary. They also sang Chirstmas songs for the younger children.


Maddness Sweeps

This week is a fun way for students and faculty to express themselves, support the school and help the football team get prepared for the game. The game ended in an exciting win over Yorkwood, 35-14.


